4. THERE WERE TWO ROWS OF PROMINENT DELEGATES SEATED ON THE PODIUM. IN THE FIRST, OR MORE PRESTIGIOUS ROW, OF A TOTAL OF 17, TWO WERE AMERICANS, BEULAH SANDERS AND MARGE TABANKIN. BOTH HAD PARTICIPATED IN THE PRE-CONFERENCE MEETS OF THE COMMITTEE OF TEN AND BOTH WERE AMONG THE MOST ACTIVE OF THE AMERICAN DELEGATES. BRONSON CLARK OF THE QUAKERS ALSO PARTICIPATED IN THE GROUP OF TEN AND [REDACTED] AS BEING WELL MOTIVATED, INTELLIGENT AND ABLE TO THINK CLEARLY.

5. IN GENERAL AMERICANS MADE VERY POOR IMPRESSION AMONGST OTHER CONFERENCE DELEGATIONS. SEVERAL OF THEM DRANK TOO MUCH AND BECAME SLOPPY, OTHERS STRETCHED OUT IN THE CORRIDORS OR PUT THEIR FEET UP ON TABLES AND TOOK NAPS, AND MANY OF THE YOUNGER ONES (BETWEEN TWENTY AND THIRTY) WERE, [REDACTED] NOT ONLY NAIVE BUT UNEDUCATED AND STUPID. [REDACTED] THE AVERAGE FRENCH WORKER OF THE PCF HAD AT LEAST LEARNED SOMETHING IN THE ARMY AND THE WORKSHOP WHEREAS THE YOUNG AMERICANS WERE A HOPELESS LOT.
