
Deputies' Meeting




Monday, 24 November 1952

PRESENT: General Smith, Messrs. Dulles, Wisner, Wolf, Amory, Col. Betts, Mr. Earman

Mr. Earman
General Smith:
a. Referred to a cable from the Senior Representative, indicating Admiral Overesch's concurrence in the transfer of the responsibility for to his command and directed that this be done.
b. Stated that Mr. Amory should consider attending the National War College possibly the next course which begins the latter part of August 1953, provided he felt he could keep an eye on his shop while away.
Mr. Dulles:
a. Noted a cable from the Senior Representative, concerning the possibility of an article to be published in NEWSWEEK regarding The Director stated he had asked Col. Grogan to look into this matter; however, he did not wish "to push" NEWSWEEK too hard.
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c. Referred to the and asked if we were doing anything about it. The Director noted he had discussed the line we should follow in this matter with Mr. Wisner. Mr. Dulles then referred to a message from under date of 23 October, which predicted and recommended that the originator be commended for his excellent and accurate reporting. The DCI approved.
d. Referred to the discussed at a recent Deputies' Meeting. The Director stated he had briefly discussed this matter with the President and we should, as a matter of urgency, obtain someone to spearhead the opposition in this area. Mr. Wisner recommended we use the individual
even though he (the individual) could not be cleared by the FBI. The Director expressed some concern over allowing the FBI

to become knowledgeable of our covert people and stated he hesitated in a good many instances to go to them when we employ covert agents with questionable clearances. Mr. Wisner pointed out that in this case this man would be used overseas. After some discussion as to ways and means of implementing this project, the Director stated (1) we should also consider using our British friends and particularly mentioned who is now in Africa; (2) in any event, provisions should be made for the assessment of the activities of the individual selected for this assignment Messrs. Dulles and Wisner undertook to furnish the Director recommendations on this problem. Mr. Wisner:	e
a. Reported that it might be necessary for Mr. William H. Jackson to delay his trip to Washington. The Director stated he intended to call him after the meeting.
