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


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PREFACE

This report is one in a series on Soviet Ground Force and Logistic installations being prepared for a DIA/CIA Panel. The series is being coordinated, published and disseminated by NPIC. The photographic analysis is being performed by the NPIC Photographic Analysis Group, the CIA Photographic Intelligence Division (NPIC), and the Production Center 1P1a (DIA). The photographic analysis for this particular report was performed by the NPIC Photographic Analysis Group.

In the interest of uniformity, the titles and letter designators for the facilities observed at these installations are identical with those appearing in the project requirement. When a specific facility is not observed both its title and letter designator are omitted in the report.

Titles and letter designators for the various facilities are as follows: (A) railroad service, (B) road service, (C) landing strips, (D) administrative and troop housing areas, (E) storage areas, (F) ammunition storage areas, (G) POL storage areas, (H) other buildings and facilities, (J) equipment storage/maintenance areas, (K) athletic fields, (L) small arms firing ranges, (M) driver training areas, (N) tank/assault gun firing ranges, (P) flat trajectory firing ranges, (Q) artillery emplacements (batteries), (R) infantry or combined arms field training area or courses, (S) special training facilities, (T) unidentified facilities or tracking activity.




FIGURE 1. LOCATION OF KEGICHEVKA ORDNANCE DEPOT TERRITORIUM.

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SUMMARY

The Kegichevka Ordnance Depot Territorium is located on the southwest edge of Kegichevka (Figure 1), covers approximately 250 acres, and is comprised of a storage area and a support area.

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


FIGURE 3. KEGICHEVKA ORDNANCE DEPOT TERRITORIUM. Sketch compiled from ______June 1964.

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

The double-secured storage area contains 54 storage buildings, 4 earth-mounded drive-through buildings, 8 support buildings, and 2 fuel storage tanks. The secured support area is adjacent to the northeast end of the storage area and contains a multistory administration building, 3

multistory barracks, 8 probable quarters, 24 support buildings, a fenced motor pool with 2 vehicle sheds, and a secured earth-covered building (Figures 2 and 3).

The installation was covered by 1960 TAL-ENT photography and 3 KEYHOLE missions between August 1962 and June 1964. Changes during this period include the completion of the 4 drive-through buildings between February 1960 and August 1962 and the addition of several support buildings in the support area.

DESCRIPTION OF INSTALLATION

Railroad Service

The depot is rail served and has a 295-foot trackside dock and a 130-foot combination sideand end-loading dock.

Road Service

A hard-surfaced road from Kegichevka serves the depot.

Administration and Troop Housing Area

Area D is a support facility for the ordnance depot and contains a C-shaped multistory administration building, 3 multistory barracks, 1 water tower, 24 miscellaneous support buildings, and 8 probable quarters. Three support buildings have been added since 1960 TALENT coverage.

General Storage Areas

Area El contains 54 storage buildings, 1 heating plant, 1 unidentified vaulted-roof building, 2 fuel storage tanks (approximately

in diameter) and 6 other buildings. Large open storage areas are located along the southeast and southwest fences.

Area E2 contains 4 earth-mounded drivethrough storage buildings. These buildings were observed under construction on 1960 TALENT photography and appear complete on August 1962 KEYHOLE coverage.

Ammunition Storage Area

Area F contains an earth-mounded probable explosives storage building secured by a wall.

Equipment Storage/Maintenance Area

Area J is a fenced motor pool with 2 vehicle sheds, one 145 by 35 feet, and one 90 by 20 feet.

Small-Arms Firing Range

Area L is a 660- by 30-foot small-arms firing range.
