## MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD

SUBJECT: Telephone Conversation with Mr. James Ennis, PSO-1

1. At approximately 0000 hours 20 August, I received a telephone call from Mr. James Ennis, U. S. State Department. Mr. Ennis is currently assigned to the State Department bureau concerned with civil aviation and apparently is directly involved with civil aviation matters affecting South Vietnam. (Mr. Ennis' immediately preceding assignment was as Civil Air Attache, American Enhance, Saigon.)

## 2. Mr. Ennis asked three specific questions:

- a. Is Saigon Station keeping FE Division informed on Continental Air Services' decision to pull out of Vietnam? I replied affirmatively and added that we also had been advised by Continental Air Services management of their plans. Mr. Ennis appeared to have no interest in specifics of the information we received.
- b. Is Air America and FE Division interested in having Air America take over the CASI/RME business in Vietnam? I replied that I had been informed by Air America that they had received a request for a proposal on the RME business and that they intended to submit a proposal. Further, FE Division had no objection to Air America's performing these services since Air America had considerable excess capability at this moment, but we did not believe that Air America should acquire new equipment to meet the RME requirement. Although the RME business is of considerable importance to the USG, it appears to be of short duration.



c. Is FE Division interested in having Air America
replace Continental Air Services in a joint venture rig
with Air Vietnam? I replied that no policy decision had
been made on this matter. Mr. Ennis then remarked that
he had been directly involved with the Agency's problems
accruing from similar attempts in and he felt that
videspread knowledge of Air America's CIA relationship
would assure that any Air America/AVN joint venture
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effort would result in greater problems and greater costs
to the USG than the problem. He then remarked
that the Department had been advised by Flying Tigers
representatives that they had some interest in attempting
to develop a joint venture relationship with Air Vietnam.
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3. Mr. Ennis then remarked the failure of CASI and AVN to reach agreement on a joint venture arrangement was in large part due to the activities of Pan American, specifically in "raising the ante." He stated that Pan American is attempting to manipulate the situation in South Vietnam to prevent entry of other carriers into the local relationship, specifically, Continental Air Lines and Flying Tigers, and is attempting to delay formulation of a new USG/GVN civil aviation bilateral agreement. I did not comment on his statements concerning Pan American activities.

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
