Why Not Now?

Now Hanoi is turning upon the Canadian component of the ICCS for speaking out the truth about the Communist downing of an ICCS helicopter that claimed nine lives.

For stating the fact that chopper was shot down by a party that is not either of the two South Vietnamese parties and which is not supposed to be in South Vietnam, in contravention of the Paris agreement, Canada's Michael Gervin is accused by Quan Doi Nha Dan, a Hanoi mouthpiece, for alleged supercilious statements.

Thus, the Communists also claim that the ill-fated chopper had strayed away from the corridor it was supposed to follow to its destination, hence, the accident happened.

It is clear, isn't it, from the above statements of the Communists themselves that they admit having shot down the chopper?

They had to admit it because a second accompanying chopper had a full load of witnesses who saw the ill-fated chopper hit with a missile, and, who, themselves were dead now.

On the next point at issue is, did the ill-fated chopper actually strays from the corridor to the extent that it was mistaken for an aggressor?

Again the co-pilot-load of witnesses, particularly the crew, testified to the contrary, pointing out emphatically that they were being GUIDED TO THEIR DESTINATION BY A COMMUNIST ELEMENT PRECISELY ACCOMPANYING THEM TO THEIR DESTINATION. Besides, the ill-fated helicopter was plainly marked ICCS.

The Communists know that they shot down the chopper while it was well within the corridor. Why? Because they tried to deceive the crew of the second accompanying chopper, who wanted to return to the airfield immediately,

but, they knew that they would lose their bearings and will be unable to testify more credibly about disappearances.

Gervin is right to insist on pursuing the probe of the shooting of the ICCS chopper. To give up now and pack up for home would be breaking down before the bitterest testing of the Communists.

It is time the Canadians have threatened to leave the ICCS if, after the due examination of their personnel, witnesses they are satisfied the Communists would do nothing because no fact has been the case who had driven the gunboats straight to the Communists.

This, the many nations who asked Canada to stay after the first 60-day period expired, realized and it would be a severe let-down if they did abandon the job.

All this brings us back to the continual unauthorised presence of North Vietnamese regulars of South Vietnamese territory—the most flagrant and uncompromising violation of the Paris agreement. As long as the NVA regulars remain on RVN territory, peace will be stillborn in all of Indochina.

Both Presidents Nixon and Thieu know too well that this is keeping the united nations to say the least and has stymied the Paris talks between the two Vietnamese parties, just as it is responsible for the carnage in Cambodia and for prolonging the twilight war in Laos.

Nixon promised vigorous actions against massive violations. Maybe it is time for him to show just what kind of vigorous action he was talking about. He has shown, in the case of the POW exchange, that he can and will do something if the Communists crossed him. Why not now?
