PROJECT RENEWAL

DECLASSIFIED AND RELEASED BY CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE AGENCY SOURCES METHODS EXEMPTION 3020 NAZI WAR CRIMES DISCLOSURE ACT NATE 2007

The purpose of this paper is to serve as a resewal and redesignation of Project NUDEPOT. This project was formerly operated as WUDEPOT under the auspices of DO Bivisium, primarily in satisfaction of military hot was requirements levied upon the Agency by the Joint Chiefs of Flati. The Project has now been transferred to SO Division by memorandam signed by the ADD/P after a series of discussions devoted to Agency (CS) counterinsurgement operational needs versus the JCE requirements with their questionship validity.

Primary justification for the renewal of the project is to support an integrated program for the entistaction of Charlestine Services contingency exquirements through the conversion of selected hot war agent reservists now on the IUDEPOT relia.

1. Current Chiestives

There are presently 116 agents on the project reserve rolls, 12 of whom are ME Division assets. Of the remaining 98 agents, 86 thus far have seen contacted in person to determine their availability for cold war contingency seeds. Of this group, 67 have agreed to participate when called upon. Additionally, four agents have been serving other elements of the Agency abroad and steps are underway to transfer these personnel to the appropriate elements. To meet anticipated celd war needs, reviews are currently being made to select, retain and further train these who have appropriate celd war qualifications and potential. It is expected that this "hard-core" cadre will number about 70. Tonversely, 23 agents have been re-evaluated downward for termination. It is believed that the 10 "hard-core" group will provide considerable support for an integrated program, under a single jurisdiction, to embrace the entire problem of C. S. continuous requirements.

2. Change

- a. Principal change being implemented for FY1966 is the redirection of the project for the maximum cold war utilization of available assets.
- b. With the project emphasis now being placed on C.S. contingency needs and only secondary attention being given the remaining JCS requirements, a following reductions have been made in project personnel and equipment:
 - (1) Two ecstract employees have been transferred to SP Division.

- (2) The remaining contract employee has been made available to OPEER for reassignment.
- (3) The four salehousekeepers have been transferred to other elements of the Agency.
- (4) Responsibility for one salehouse has been transferred to Office of Legistics together with household effects.
- (5) The lease on the remaining safehouse is being cancelled 31 May 1905 and the safehouse property has been transferred to Office of Security.
- (5) The lease on the one enterpartment has been cancelled effective 31 May 1945 and all turnibure, having been classified as unserviceable by Office of Legistics, has been denoted to Goodwill Industries.
- (7) The two enfections in Washington, D. C. have been transferred, tensible with farmiture, to SR Division and Office of Logistics.
- (3) All effice furniture, equipment, supplies and safes in excess to the revised T/O have been turned in to the Agency warehouse.
- (3) The TVA has been reduced by ten vehicles, two of which were transferred to DO Division and eight to Office of Legistics.
- (10) Of the 23 stell personnel, three have been transferred and Office of Personnel has been asked to reassign size additional.
- (11) The 14 military personnel new on board are being reduced to five who will be retained with the project. Initial retention of this minimal staff (which will be reviewed as the project redirects to its new primary tank) is considered mandatory to:
 - (A) Comment bone fide coordination and links on with military circums at various military training sites on an opposite-member basis.
 - (B) Operate and maintain Fort Meads and Camp Pickett training sites to include M-hour logistical support of restricted and "black" agests undergoing training.

- (C) Provide instructor capability in a wide range of paramilitary subjects, pending OTE assumption of responsibility therefor, including:
 - (1) Combat experienced individuals familiar with small unit tactics and guerrilla warfare.
 - (2) Aerial delivery and airhears training capability by fully condition military paracounts and regress.
- (D) Generally provide full time cover for Status and Action in a variety of circumstances which predictably will arise but the const maters of which is unknown.

2. Intelligence Production

Not applicable, per on, to the project. It is assumed that components tilizing project assets in Source configuracy elizations will derive intelligence as a product of such use.

4. Effectives

- a. Insermed as past goals have been for the satisfaction of hot war equirements, there has been no measure against which to judge the effectiveness the program. However, as reported previously, the main tests and proofs effectiveness were the responses to WH and Ed Division contingency needs on a total of 43 agants volunteered for cold war assignments well removed that the hot war needs for which they had been recruited and trained. Additionally, were the years and in individual cases, wight agents have performed specific contains assignments for various elements of the C.S., four of whom are estimated above and being permanently transferred to the respective Divisions.
- b. Another pensible measure of effectiveness was the participation of exteen agent graduates in all military managers (SWIFTSTRIKE III) and twenty-six agent graduates in a European military exercise (SEARULER) in 1964. All reports received from both the military and WFS representatives in the field reflected very high quality personal performance and effective coordination on the part of the agents.

5. Problems

There have been to caresolved project problems, however, arrangements are been made with Office of Security to have all agents releated prior to any name operational commitment.

- 4. With the paristence of OTE, provide during early PY1985 two weeks refresher/advence training for the ME Division ARLEAP accepts.

- e. In addition to a programmed retraining of select paramale in the use of the AS-3 communications equipment, Office of Communications would had be called upon for support in the refresher training preceding any given upon training program, depending on the specifics of the operational needs.
- I. A blind breadenst program was initiated during FY1965 through which the agents maintain their communication skills. Upon receipt of the periodic proadcasts they are required to perform a variety of clandestine activities such as selection of dead drops, landing somes, drop zones, various type targets and so forth. Report of this activity is then made to the project officers through 5/W. Presently this effect is being conducted for the 12 ME Division ARLEAP agents and 25 of the 28 CHWHIPPER agent personnel. About 25 additional select IUDEPOT trained agents are in the process of being equipped with inexpensive receivers to enable them to take part in this training. Office of homomomications has been requested to continue their broadcast support of this faces of training.
