MEMORANDUM FOR: Deputy Director (Plans)

THROUGH: Chief, EE Division

SUBJECT: Commitment of EE Division Wartime Agents to Support of EE Division Warlike Contingency Plan Requirements

1. This memorandum contains a proposal submitted for DD/P approval. Such proposal is contained in paragraph 5.
2. As a result of meetings initiated in October between representatives of EE and ER Divisions to determine how EE can most effectively support EE's contingency planning for wartime operations against the EE Satellite areas, agreement was reached that EE's Warlike Operations has capabilities which would be augmented to provide the support required. In the interests of both efficiency and economy, it was determined that this purpose could be accomplished through an expanded and accelerated spotting, assessment, recruitment, and training program based on the exploitation of EE's existing wartime agent training mechanism (ANWAROP).
3. In recognition of the urgent nature of EE's Warlike contingency plan requirements, ER has closely supported their efforts to expedite a spotting and assessment program to develop a list of agent candidates of Eastern European Satellite origin from which a minimum of 15 could be selected for an accelerated and tailored training program along the lines of that ER has been providing to agents being trained for the acceptance of JCS wartime requirements in the USSR. Further, an understanding was reached that the agents to be trained for EE could be made ready for possible operational use in the EE Satellite areas by approximately 25 January 1962. This schedule was predicated on a 10-week training period as a minimum and on the assumption that the prescribed number of cleared EE agent candidates could be on hand physically at EE's Domestic Operations Base to begin training on 20 November 1962, the earliest

practicable date after BR's regularly scheduled course (for agents currently in training to meet JCS wartime requirements in the USAR) is completed.

4. It has subsequently become evident that the 20 November target date for the beginning of training for SS agents cannot be met because of lack of resources. As a consequence, it has been agreed between BR and IS that every effort should be made, through an intensified recruitment program undertaken jointly by BR and IS, to incorporate into the regularly scheduled BR course beginning on 12 February 1962 up to 15 to 20 agent candidates for wartime use in the IS Subelite areas.

5. With the postponement from 20 November 1962 to 12 February 1962 of the scheduled starting date for the training of agent candidates for wartime option in the IS Subelite areas, IS has proposed that the 18 Polish-speaking agents (for the west part of German-occupied areas) among BR Division's specialties of agents already trained through ARROYO be considered for temporary reassignment to JCS targets in the Subelite areas from the JCS-approved requirements in the USAR already accepted on the basis of these Brazilian agents. Such a reassignment has been proposed as an emergency measure to enable IS to be prepared for any contingency that might arise prior to the time IS's agent candidates are ready for operational use.

6. If you approve the temporary reassignment of BR's already trained agents as proposed by IS Division, it will be necessary for BR to establish contact at the earliest practicable date with the agents to determine their willingness to participate in operations against targets located in the IS Subelite areas (west Germany Poland) in lieu of their own ethnic area in the USAR for which they were originally recruited. Consequently, prompt action will be called for to make possible the early recall for two weeks of operational training and indoctrination of these agents who are willing and qualified. While a record of 19 out of 20 emergency assignments on the occasion of BR's approach to agents previously trained through BR's wartime program has invariably used in support of US Division's operations early this year suggests the possibility of a reasonably high percentage of acceptance in this instance, a high degree of participation may well be called for in some cases to certain agents of German origin that they should count themselves to possible action against targets in Poland (or any other Eastern European Subelite areas) and to prevail upon individual agents to absent themselves from their duties in the form of the coming Christmas holiday season. Also, it is likely that difficulties will be encountered

by case agents in attempting to prevail upon their employers to provide the required leave of absence on such relative short notice.

7. Your approval of the proposal outlined in paragraph 5 as well as the implementing action discussed in paragraph 6 is requested.
