MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR

SUBJECT: AERDEPOT Agent Availability

The total number of AERDEPOT graduates is 1,100, which are in
inductive course for the field program. The course is the result
of a national emergency. The active number is 1,100, as initially trained
and in a national emergency and the primary purpose for emergency of
a special course. All of these have had a basic training period of 3 to 6
months. In addition, must have undergone some intensive advanced summer
training.

1. There are 10 individuals proposed for the August 1961 training
group. In addition, 10 are scheduled for February 1962. Under a national
emergency, the August 1961 training group could probably be augmented by
1-2 more individuals.

2. The AERDEPOT training program is primarily oriented towards
the Para Military, but with considerable attention devoted to PT type
training. A large portion of the training time is given to Communications
Training. Other subjects might include Principles of Coastal Warfare,
Construction and Engineering, Basic Hand-to-Hand Combat, Small Arms
Qualification and Marksmanship, etc.

3. All of the AERDEPOT Graduates, in addition to English, speak
their native tongue and at least one other. In most cases a Slavic language.
The most professional non-military language spoken is German.

4. A considerable number of AERDEPOT Graduates have been used outside
of the fundamental AERDEPOT requirements. These include primarily Para
Military and RIBBON Activities.
