Progress Report covering period 15 Oct. 1951 - 16 Feb. 1952

- 2. Our relationship with the BNR has thus far been relatively prefitable in the number of well qualified agents that have been obtained for penetration operations. The difficulty thus far has been the high percentage of rejects. These percentage figures should not be regarded with too much discouragement, however, when it is balanced against the results of other projects, and in addition when one remembers the very high degree of qualifications which have been demanded from these candidates during their CAP assessment. In connection with the CAP assessment and the suggestions made re its improvement in Paragraph 7B of the attachment, it should be noted that these steps can now be expedited by CSOB since the responsibility for ELOPE REDSOX recruitment has come under our control.
- 3. Re the expansion of the AEQUOR project in Western Europe, referred to in the attachment as AEQUOR/WEST, the suggested utilization of CAMBISTA 2's organization covers a variety of purposes in which both the SR and EE Divisions should be interested. With Germany being rapidly exhausted as a recruiting ground, even for current operations, it is clear that our attention must be focused on Western Europe and/or the United States. In point of fact all of the current AEQUOR agent candidates have been recruited from Western Europe. The difficulty with the process thus far has been that we have been unable to screen the agent candidates at the source, and the suggestions made in the attachment are designed to improve this defect.
- 4. The potential of CAMBISTA 2's various national groups in Western Europe in the field of psychological and political warfare and propaganda appear to be reasonably obvious and the support of this potentiality would be regarded by CAMBISTA 2 as a satisfactory political "quid pro quo" for his continuing supply of agent candidates.

In any case it is clear that to implement any part of AEQUOR/WEST it will initially be necessary to coordinate through the Western Europe Division to their local stations in the various countries named in the attackment for the purpose of establishing local contact, initially through but possibly later through the local station personnel, with the local branch of CAMBISTA 1. Since such coordination will require aggressive Washington action, we are very anxious to have your reaction to the suggestions made in Paragraph 7C at the earliest possible time with some indication of when, if approved by you, such action can be taken.

1. MESULTS OF CAMULSTA 2 SPOTTIMO:

GAMBISTA 2 has furnished us to date with a total of 64 names of Belorussians for assessment by CAF (Combined Assessment Program USOS/ZEKLOPE). Of this number, 50 are located in England, 10 in Belgium, 3 in France and 1 in Spain. Name traces have been initiated on all, with negative returns received on all except for 4 recent additions, about which results are not yet known.

2. RABULTS OF CAP ASSESSMENT:

a. Number of candidates assessed by CAP to date:

Since the initiation of CAP on 15 October 1951, a total of 29 candidates spotted through CAMBLETA 2 channels have been assessed by CAP.

In addition to the above, one candidate (CARMISTA 5) was assessed and found suitable for limited/cutout functions, and another candidate (CARTOSANTO 6) was assessed outside of CARTOSANTO 6 and recruited for immediate agent training.

3. PRESENT AGENTS SITUATION:

a. Agents recruited between 15 November 1951 and 30 January 1952:

CAMBISTA 5, CAMPOSATOS 4, 5, 6 and 7.

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b. CAMBISTA 5 Status:

Subject has performed satisfactorily as leg man and CAMBLETA 1 representative vis a vis candidates appearing in Munich for assessment. His other duties have been; translations of CAF test-administration material; transmittal in and out of England of candidates and agents travel documents for application therein of Combined Travel Board entry permits; transmittal of funds to the CAMBLETA 1 organization in England to cover the expenses of candidates traveling to Munich for assessment.

c. CAMPOSANTOS L and 6 Statue:

Subjects have begun training on 14 January.

d. CAMPUSANTO 7 Status:

Subject was assessed and recruited during the week of 11 January 1952. He was instructed to return to England to settle his personal affairs and was summoned back to Munich for training on 29 January 1952, Subject began training on 30 January 1952. On 7 February, as notified by MAT that subject had refused to Jusp off the parachute tower during the last three days. Cambiata 2, who was conferring with [... in Munich at the time, was informed of this fact, and urged a last effort to persuade CAFFOSAMTO 7 to jump. In the event this failed, CAMBISTA 2 agreed to make every effort to dispose of CAMPOSANTO 7 in the mest secure manner. Various disposal methods were discussed based on the necessity of sealing off CAMPUNANTO 7 from outside contacts, at least during the period prior to dispatch of AEQUOR Team One. In spite of the difficulties involved in conducting a full surveillance jeb on CAMPUBANTO 7 for about three months. CAMBLETA 2 felt that he could successfully seal CAMPUSANTO 7 off by throwing him in the midst of the CAMBISTA 3 clite in Louvain, assigning a team of men to take turns in keeping CAMPOSAMTO 7 under 24 hours ebservation. On 8 February 1952 went to MAT and failed to talk CAMPOSANTO 7 into jumping. Inquiries with CAMPOS 2, 4 and 6 failed to reveal any clues either absolving or condemning CAMPUSANTO 7 as a possible penetration agent. The CAMPUSANTUS seem to think that he merely chickened out. This epinion is also held by CAMSISTA 5 who later handled the subject. Disposel methods were discussed with and It was decided that the rigorousness of 2h hours surveillance of CAMPOSANTO 7 could encourage him to blow information known to him in view of subsequent sourcess and resentment. While abiding to the original concept of isolating CARPUSAMPO 7 within the CAMBLUTA 3 complex in Belgium, it was recommended that he be handled on the

basis of his cooperation, villinguous and largity to GAMMISTA 1 and 2. wes instructed to take charge of CANPOSMTO 7 on that seem day and to arrange for his disposal. Subject was turned ever to GARBISTA 5 during the night of 8 February 1952 with instructions not to leave agh other for a minute until further nation. On 9 February 1952; [briefed both non on the security besards involved in the situation, stressing extreme carefulness and the necessity of avoiding all extends combacts while CAMPOSAMPO 7 was still in Germany. The unevoidability of temperarily restricting CAMPOGARTO 7's wheresboute was explained to him. and his proposed stay in Bolgium was presented to him as an organizational haven for substitute activities, where he would be expected to prove himsolf a conscientious organisational worker under the patronage and guidance of experienced CAMBISTA) activists. CAMBISTA 5 was taken solds and briston on the situation as seen by us and CAMBISTA 2, and was instructed to assume full responsibility for CAMPOSARTO 7's custody while on route to Belgium. Since CARPOSARTO 7 holds a British travel document, it is impossible for him to obtain a Belgian entry visa outside of England. In view of this fact, CANNISTA 5 was instructed to escert CANPOSANTO 7 to Leudon, obtain a Belgian visa for him, escert him to Belgian and deliver him along with our disposal recommendations to CAMBISTA 2. Both men left on the first log of their trip on 11 February 1952.

e. CAMPUSARTO 5 States:

Subject was assessed and recruited during the week of 10 December 1952. and was instructed to report to Munich for training on 2 January 1952. Subject failed to report on that date. CAMBLETA 2 was questioned on the matter on 4 January 1952 and stated having seen CANPOSANTO 5 in England o/a 25 December 1951. Ascerding to CAMBLETA 2, CAMPOSAMEQ 5 had reconsidered his availability for immediate operations on the grounds that he considered himself better qualified for war time use due to his purely military background. In order to obtain first-hand information on the natter, a telegram was sent to GAMPOSANTO 5 requesting him to come to Menich for discussions. Subject appeared in Munich on 11 Jamery 1952. Daring extensive conversations with _____ subject accounted for his change of heart in a namer which seemed to indicate that he was genuinely eager to serve his fatherland in any capacity, providing he felt convinced that he was qualified to do the job at hand. Subject was repeatedly encouraged to admit the existence in his mind of such positive factors as feer, disinterest, organizational apathy or conflicts. Subject stalidly clung to his initial argument. After reaching, and waddling in, a stalemate of relicrations, it was decided to present subject with a direct, clear-cut and final proposition. Subject's present qualifications for immediate operations were firmly and clearly explained to him. He was told that we would make it our business to equip him with additional. qualifications before we would consider sending him out on his mission. The importance of subject's contribution in enlisting in immediate operations, as well as the prevailing urgent need for his services, were stressed to him. Finally, decision was left to GANTUSANTO 5 to reconsider the whole issue in the light of the above statement of facts, and to come up with whatever decision he saw fit, as long as it could be termed final by all concerned. Subject decided to accept our proposal

and just himself at our disposal for immediate tributer after having settled his personal affairs in England. Subject Arrived at this decision with what appeared to be shacked Adequitables and imprestionable conviction. Subject Left for England on 15 January 1952 with instructions to report to Maniel immediately when summened. He definite date was not due to the finis state of AEGUOR operational planning which them provailed. However, subject was informed that he was to consider himself slorted as of 25 February 1952. As a result of subsequent operational planning, it was decided to keep GANFOSALTOS in reserve until the furnation of AEGUOR Years Two, but due to the aforte-mentioned GANFOSANTO 7 situation, decision was made to summer SANFOSANTO 5 immediately to replace GANFOSANTO 7 in AEGUOR Team One. A telegram summening GANFOSANTO 5 was sent him on 9 to brusay 1952, to which he summered that the will arrive in Munich to commone training an 16 Juny party 1952.

2. Additional AEQUEE parsonnels

A safe-house-keeper couple (GAMBISTA 6 and 7) have been assessed during the week of 1h January 1952 and began keeping house for the GAMPONANTOS on 30 January 1952.

L. GENERAL BUTTING SITUATION:

a. Situation in England:

The relatively large output of candidates for assessment emanating from England is apparently due to the strong organizational structure of Belorussians in that country. The Association of Selerussians in Great Britain and affiliated organizations are assisting candidates slated for assessment in Hamish in matters of visus and finances under organizational cover. GARBISTA 2 went to England in December 1951 and reported that spotting of agent candidates as well as PA and PS candidates will continue at an even page.

b. Situation in Franco,

According to GAMBISTA 2, the poer results of spetting in France are due to the scattered and organizationally unscendingted State of local Belorussians. As a matter of fact, GAMBISTA 2 has gaver case up with a satisfactory explanation regarding this situation. It is conceivable that his reppert with the loaders of Belorussian organizations in France is bad, or that the local leaders may disapprove of militant activities in general and spetting for casessament by a foreign power in particular. The fact remains that considerable progress should be achieved in this field in France with or without GAMBISTA 2's help.

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6. ACTION PERDING

E. Spetting for ADMER Tem Two

On 8 Polymary 1958 CAMBLELA 2 was informed of the mosempley to have a minimum of two agains in M/2 training by 15 Harch 1952 at the latest, if ARSON from two was to become a reality. b. Projected expansion of CAMBISTA 1 quests in Mestern Merepe:

Daring conferences with CANALSTA 2 in January 1952; the entire great of past and present ARCHER activities were reviewed in an attempt to improve the results of our present efforts and expend beyond the current framework of my solivities, taking as a besis the present meet for intensified enti-Berdel actions in Europe, the following project tentatively cryptomened ARCHER/ARREST was constituded and expended to GANALSTA 2:

- (1) Spot, essees, resputt and train high Lovel GAMMISTA | members in England, France, Belgium, Spain, Seeden, Demark and Italy, to initiate, develop and carry out the following activities in their countries of residence:
 - (a) Spetting, preliminarily essenting and reuting to us of egents, Al and PA conditatos.
 - (b) Gathering a notwork of letter-drope in current contact with the Mil.
 - (c) Reporting on strongth, location, political learnings, proving littles, satisfaces, affiliations and IS contacts tooks of local entry groups.
 - (d) Infiltration of GP dominated enigre groups.
 - (e) Observing, analyzing, tabulating and reporting on methods, channels and scope of Seviet propagates for counter action.

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- (f) writing, printing and distributing anti-Soviet leaflets.
- (a) Designing, printing and posting anti-Soviet posters.
- (b) Editing, printing and distributing anti-Soviet publica-
- (i) Activating, erganizing and participating in anti-Seviet
- (j) Spotting, assessing and recruiting indegenes for penetration of local GP erganisations.
- (k) Doubling of Soviet or GP agents within enigre groups.
- (1) Contacting, cultivating and defecting local Soviet personnel.
- (m) Spotting, assessing, recruiting and training additional CARNISTA 1 personnel for local agent and leg work.
- (n) Establishing a notwork of safe houses and deed letter drops for use in the event of war.
- (c) spetting, assessing, recruiting and briefing of stay behinds.
- (p) Writing and mailing poison pen letters.
- (q) Enlisting the services of the Belerussian clargy for evert anti-Soviet attacks.
- (r) Organizing anti-Seviet reading rooms.
- (s) Gethering and transmitting Seviet publications.

It is enticipated that if authorised by Headquarters, this project could be activated by summer 1952. The nen spotted by GANBISTA 2 to carry out the above activities will report to Bunish for assessment and whatever training will have been devised for them by us. It is expected that we will pay them full salaries and provide them with operational funds, for which they will be accountable to us.

7. AECOMMENDATIONS,

a. For higher spotting selectivity:

Instauch as over fifty percent of candidates spotted by GAMBISTA 2 and sent to Munich for assessment are rejected, it seems imperative

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to work out a pre-assessment serventary daylog, which would attended less of time, personnel and exponditure by discussivelying underlimble elements in their countries of residence and provinting their wasteful convergence on Benick. It is the opinion of the undersigned that covers intervious with candidates in their countries of residence could be laid on for an American case efficer with fluent knowledge of Inseien under the cover and with the assistance of CAMBISTA I. The case officer egald thus determine the petential of candidates locally and in one sweep rather than doing it in Munich by degrees and belatedly. On) December 1951, the undersigned conferred in Brussels with a representative [in an effect to present erganise and initiate the efere-mentions id seroming deriv being edviced of the difficulties involved in dealine with enion groups in Delgium, the undersigned fellowed recommendation of delaying all matters pertaining to direct con-test with GAMBUSTA 1 and 3 members in Balgium, pending further conferences / The undersigned was advised that a representative i reld appear in Musich in the luture to restine tells on the matter. Singe so immediate action to get pre-essessment screening underway be possible in Belgium, dee, primarily, to the conferent inability to determine the procedence of one priority as appe current epoputions), it is other (REDSOX VE. felt that Beedquarters decision and guidance should precede all attempts to embark on similar negotiations with any local station.

b. For improvement of GAP:

(1) Security:

In view of the imprecticality of effectively setting off the GAP translating staff (composed of previsionally elected, non-US personnel) from sensitive inferentian, it is recommended that all personnel connected with GAP be in possession of full operational clearance. Attempts to isolate sens nembers of GAP personnel from operational knowledge evaluable to others has proved unsuccessful and is, in the estimation of the undersigned, a grave accurity risk.

(2) Availability of operational personnels

In order to set up CAP as self-relient assessing unit independent from project case officers acting as interregators, and free-landing Carriage operators upon whose swallability CAP has had to depend, it is recommended that a permanent operational staff comprising interregators and Carriago operators be assigned to CAP. In order to brief the staffinterregators on the specific project requirements regarding

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the group being assessed, the necessary communications could be made to the interrogators by the project case efficier on the initial day of assessment. Experience has proved that a minimum of three interrogators and one Carriage operator are required to cover the operational assessment of a group of six assessment in the five days GAP program now in effect.

(3) Us Army conters

Describe as candidates assessed by GAP are told by GARRISTA 2 spetters that they will be assessed by a US military consistion for the purpose of determining their military qualifications for war time use, it is recommended that a pertian of the personnel at CAP be equipped with Army uniforms to correberate Army cover. The absence of uniforms at the assessment site has an occasion caused embarrassing queries on the part of assesses.

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Authorisation is requested from Headquarters to normit the AEQUOR case efficer to make personal contact C in England, France, Balgism, Sweden, Denmark, Spain and Italy, in order to:

- (1) Make arrangements enabling the ABUJOR case officer to persenally destant leaders and preminent personalities of CANDISTA 1 and affiliated organisations in all afore-montioned countries, to:
 - (a) Pally exploit, better erganise, and widen the present field of group contacts, in an effort to implement the existing anti-Seviet petential of ARQUOR.
 - (b) Locate a possible substitute for GARMISTA 2, to be recruited in the event GARBISTA 2 quite for political or other reasons.
 - (c) Leaste, sound out and possibly cultivate Beleruseian movements, groups or individuals appeared to GAMBISTA 1, or politically unattached.
- (2) Coordinate all projected AEQUOR/WEST activities.
- (3) Implement with our group contacts all similar activities carried out by the local stations.
