SUBJECT: REDSOX/Outline of AEQUOR Operation Plan

Personnel: CAMPOSANTOS 2, 4, 5, 6

Equipment: See Annex "A"

Mission: To initiate the establishment of operational

support facilities in the B.S.S.R.

Implementation of Mission: See KAUF 569

PHASE I: April to July

Group to be air-dropped during April moon period. DZ to be as close as practicable to the base area and in no case farther than twenty-five miles (Drop night, 5 miles, plus 10 miles for next two nights.) Base Area is the Nalibeki Forest (see attached map). Group to reach heart of Base Area not later than D-night plus 3; establishment of temporary base. First w/t contact -- D plus 4. Group spends next week in systematic reconnaissance of Base Area in order to get feel of local situation and select first permanent base site. By 1 May construction of Base bunker to be completed. During May continue reconnaissance of Base Area. Select sites for w/t sets, etc.

During June and July, while CAMPOSANTOS 2 and 4 continue to man the base as w/t operator and assistant, respectively, CAMPOSANTOS 5 and 6 will extend the range of their reconnaissance to include towns, e.g. LIDA, MOLODECHNO, NOVOGRUDOK in the Operational Area. Since these trips may, in some cases, take several days, special security precautions will have to be taken by those who remain behind at the base. The principal tasks of CAMPOSANTOS 5 and 6 during their reconnaissances will be the passive collection of operational data. Nearby settlements and inhabited points to be avoided. If results of the reconnaissance are auspicious, an attempt is to be made (on the basis of operational data collected) to re-paper CAMPOSANTO 5 or CAMPOSANTO 6 and establish him legally in a peripheral town.

If this can be done, the man so established will be cut off from direct contact with remainder of the group. Sole contact to be by dead-drop with one-way control. Base to be moved immediately.

Henceforth, while CAMPOSANTOS 2 and 4 remain at the second permanent base, either CAMPOSANTO 6 or CAMPOSANTO 5 (whichever has not been legalized) will, in addition to regular scouting activities, service dead-drop between Base and resident. Resident to play purely passive role and concentrate on living self into new cover. Absolutely no recruiting or political activity. Maximum

permissible to be spotting reports on acquaintances, associates which will be transmitted together with operational data (especially document intelligence) by dead-drop.

PHASE II: July to October

Continuation of activities initiated in PHASE I plus: Selection of at least four widely separated DZs. Report back by w/t on characteristics of these DZs. Reception of supplies (probably October) and personnel (1 w/t operator and 1 scout/contact man). Legalization of one more group member in a nearby town. Establishment of dead-drop communication with him. Movement of base to third permanent site.

PHASE III: November to April

W/T operator and courier/scouts dig in for winter. Reduced courier service to dead-drops. Residents continue living selves into cover.

PHASE IV: April ----

On the basis of resident's spotting reports should be possible to select limited number of local dissidents as candidates for recruitment.

In no case is recruitment to be effected by resident established in same town and acquainted with candidate. This to be done by one of courier/scouts.

Testing new recruits.

Through new recruits a beginning can be made towards setting up of an operational support structure -- i.e., cutout, courier and safehouse facilities.

PHASE V:

Dependent on results of PHASES I, II, III, IV.


