SUBJECT: REDSOX/AERODYNAMIC/Progress Report for the period 10 May -31 May 1952

1. Administrative

a. On 15 May the CARTHAGEs were moved from their safehouse at Kaufbeuren to 13 Am Anger, Bad Woerishofen. The move was primarily for security reasons and was made convenient by the fact that an unused (in the sense that no agent or group of agents have ever lived in it) house became available for this purpose. They had lived in the vacated house for almost a year and prior to their stay there, the house was occupied by another group of agents. This fact alone warranted a move in conformance with good and standard security measures. Otherwise, it was deemed wise to remove the CARTHAGEs from their old surroundings sometime prior to the date of their imminent dispatch, just in case they might have been under surveillance by the opposition.

b. The new house has a well enclosed back yard in which the CARTHAGEs have constructed a volleyball court. Now, much of their spare time is spent here and to good physical advantage.

2. Training

a. Commo

i. During the period covered by this report, CARTHAGEs 10, 12 and 13 have received instruction in Russian Morse Code and have mastered it to the extent that they now copy taped Soviet news sent out by this medium. Their proficiency in the use of RMC is good and is increasing by daily practice in its use. It is doubtful that they will ever be called upon to use RMC to communicate with us, but it should prove useful to them once they are on a mission and desire to listen to Soviet news broadcast in code.

ii. In order to train less trained W/T operators either here or while on a mission, CARTHAGEs 10, 12 and 13 have been assisting our instructors in training CARTHAGEs 15 and 16 in commo. This has proved beneficial to all concerned—CARTHAGEs 10, 12 and 13 are gaining new experience and at the same time improving their own commo techniques, while CARTHAGES 15 and 16, and especially CARTHAGE 15, are grasping the instruction given them much more rapidly because it is given in their own native language and by those who have gone through the mill and understand the difficulties and how to overcome them.

iii. As reported previously, CARTHAGE 15 has shown a remarkable aptitude for commo. In two weeks time he has completed all preliminary tapes which cover the whole alphabet and has already begun cipher work and sending. At this pace, he could possibly become a radio operator by the middle of July, needing, of course, only practice to bring him up to the level of say CARTHAGE 12. At present he is spending seven hours each day in commo training and will continue this schedule indefinitely.

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iv. CARTHAGE 16, while diligent and hard working, has been unable to grasp commo training as rapidly as CARTHAGE 15. He has made progress, however, in spite of the fact that his code aptitude test showed that he would probably never become a W/T operator. He will continue in commo training until the group is dispatched and if by that time he is not an operator, he will serve as an escort for the other members of the team.

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b. Radio Theory and Practice

i. During the period covered in this report, CARTHAGES 10, 12 and 13 were given a two-hour daily lecture on radio theory which was a continuation of the same lecture begun in April. This lecture included: 1) explanation of transmission of radio waves, 2) their propagation and subsequent reception, 3) reception of radio waves, 4) vacuum tube detectors and their various amplification stages, and 5) problems of supplying power to all the tubes.

ii. Coupled with the lectures given, practical demonstrations were conducted. Here, with the aid of the instructor, CARTHAGEs 10, 12 and 13 built a simple one-tube radio receiver.

iii. CARTHAGES 15 and 16 were excluded from these lectures on theory in order that they might devote their entire time to W/T training.

c. Simulated Communication Between Field and Base

1. _____ ran separate eight-hour sessions with CARTHAGES 10, 12 and 13 on code, danger signal and message composition. Gallo, acting as "the Base", and using "Live" code pads similar to those to be used on the actual W/T link, composed and exchanged cable correspondence with the ______i.e. CARTHAGES 10, 12 and 13.

ii. This individual instruction in simulated communications will be continued until the CARTHAGEs are dispatched, and should offer some assurance that each operator will understand the use of his own danger and control indicators.

d. Weapons Firing

i. One afternoon session was held on the firing range. Here the CARTHAGEs fired the Carbine and the Browning 9 mm pistol, weapons selected by them to be used on their mission.

e. Physical Fitness

i. All are in good condition, physically, and continue their daily hour physical fitness exercises which should keep them that way.

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3. CARTHAGE 3

a. The disposition of CARTHAGE 3 has not yet been decided, although some steps have been taken in this direction by both CASSOWARY 3 and Tentatively, the disposal of CARTHAGE 3 has been left to the CASSOWARIES, who, incidentally are in a quandry as to what is the best solution to the problem. In the meantime, CARTHAGE 3 continues to sit idle at his palatial residence awaiting his ultimate fate.

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b. A detailed account of this episode will be submitted upon completion of some positive action in the direction of disposing CARTHAGE 3.

4. The CASSOWARIES

a. CASSOWARY 6 has spent approximately four days each week with the CARTHAGES, and has been very helpful, merely by his presence, in keeping the morale of the CARTHAGES high.

b. CASSOWARY 3 and 4 have made weekly visits with the CARTHAGEs during the past three weeks. Other than for morale building purposes, any other reasons for their visits are not known to Gallo, for when in their presence during these past several weeks, only general topics of interest were discussed and never anything pertaining to an operation.
