With the receipt of an [] trace we have decided to proceed and are sending under separate cover a translation of the [] trace, and a photo of Subject (Mr. 2 on photo) along with AREDOGA/1 and Theodor Bidnyk (Mr. 1 on photo). A PQA for contact, assessment and recruitment has been requested.</p> <p>2. Theodor Bidnyk, a simple working man but a strong Ukrainian Nationalist, and casual informant of AREDOGA learned that AREDOGA/1 was interested in organizing some of the second generation Ukrainians in order to inculcate in them a knowledge of and love for the language and culture of their fathers. He thereupon called upon Subject and secured her agreement to act as AREDOGA/1's informant on young people of Ukrainian descent in the School of Oriental Languages. The relationship is, of course, overt and innocent at this point, but she has already produced the names of 4 Ukrainians who are studying the language. AREDOGA/1 made her acquaintance at a dance on 16 January and met her again in her parents' home the following day. After his illness and absence from Paris, AREDOGA/1 has again made contact with her family on 6 June when she was away at a youth conference (details unavailable as yet) in Metz and with Subject herself on 16 June.</p> <p>3. The young lady displays a good upbringing in her home, according to AREDOGA/1. She is popular and gregarious and well-liked by her friends. She is intelligent, gifted for languages (French, Ukrainian, Polish, Russian, Spanish, and English) and hopes some day to go into the French diplomatic service (presumably as a secretary/typist). In January, AREDOGA/1 was informed by Olean SAWCHINE, Lecturer in Ukrainian at the School of Oriental Languages, that Subject was making great progress in Ukrainian and had been selected to spend a year as an exchange student in Kiev. This was confirmed by Subject's parents on 6 June and by Subject herself on 12 June.</p> <p>4. The Writer had not previously heard of any exchange students in Kiev. AREDOGA/1 says, however, that foreign students learning the Ukrainian language and literature will now be sent to Kiev to perfect their knowledge. According to him the Ukrainian language newspaper "Nasze Slovo" published in Warsaw, states that this year 32 students from Poland, 30 from Czechoslovakia and 7 from Yugoslavia are being sent to Kiev for a special course in Ukrainian Language and Literature during the months of July, August, and September. If these students from the Eastern countries are perfecting their knowledge in Kiev, AREDOGA/1 feels that students of Ukrainian in the West might also go there, and if that has so far not been the case in Paris, it is because there have been too few students of Ukrainian here or else that no student in Paris has expressed any desire to go there.</p>
