From 28 Nov to 14 Dec 1962 a Soviet Delegation of Specialists on fundament-constructions visited PARIS and other places all over France, on invitation of the French firm "BENOTO", 55-57 Avenue Kleber, Paris XVIIe. "BENOTO" was introducing the delegation to French methods of building fundaments with an intention to induce through the delegation the Soviet government to order BENOTO's machines for drilling and constructing fundaments. The specialists competences were restricted to a fact-finding and "expertise" mission. After their tour they seemed to be quite impressed with Benoto's method and promised to recommend Benoto's machines highly to their government. However, one of them - DULEEV, fnu- stressed privately to the Source that he personally considered the Soviet method of "hammering in" the fundaments more preferable and would recommend Benoto's machines only for some specific cases. (Contrary to the Soviet technique Benoto's method consists in drilling fundament-holes in diameter from 60 to 120 cm. and filling them with concrete. Benoto-machines are capable to penetrate much deeper than any other so far known apparatuses incl. American ones).

Benoto-machine was exhibited at the French Exposition in MOSCOW in 1961 and KHRUSHCHEV himself seemed to be very interested in it. His comment was: "we need at least a hundred of such devices". As a result of it BENOTO hoped to make quite a business with the Soviet government and still was cherishing these great expectations. So far, however, the Soviet government bought only one machine which was working now in KIEV and where they achieved with it a depth-record of over 100 m. In his praising the Benoto-

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machine KHRUSHCHEV emphasized that they would need them above all for irrigational works in KAZAKHSTAN. The price of a machine is about\$120,000.-.

Two Benoto-machines are working max in Rumania (in petroleum industry) and now also Prague and Sofia are getting interested in those apparatuses. Also Bucaresti is planning to make additional orders.

About 40 Benoto-machines have been supplied to the French Army.

Same day they visited two other firms in PARIS, were given a party at the BENOTO at which they also listened to a lecture on French fundaments-technique by a French professor, and in the evening went altogether to LIDO. With exception of SMORODINOV who pretended not to enjoy Lido all the others had great time.

13 Dec they had for themselves and spent most of it on shopping in Paris, and partly on sightseeing. They complained about having very little time. In the very beginning, after their arrival, they were told by BENOTO to prolong their visit since the schedule worked out by the French firm required at least three weeks. They tried it next day at the Embassy but were simply laughed at and told that this was a routine with all Soviet delegations in Paris to ask for prolongation.

14 Dec 1962 at 9.30 the delegation left by plane from ORLY for MOSCOW. The Source left them on 12 dec after Lido and did not see them to the plane.

All expenses of their tour in France were covered by BENOTO. Besides, each of them was also given by Benoto a gas-lighter with reserves, parfume forthess wifes, commercial diary, bottle of good cognac, a vallet, and POKREVSKAYA - also received a scarf.

4. With exception of SMORODINOV and POKREVSKAYA who hade been abroad before, they all were very much impressed with all in France, with hotels, shops, food, general prosperity and the French way of life. They also tried their best to save as much as possible on their own expenses in order to be able to shop in Paris. Thus, they even brought their sausage and fardines. And ,of course, all kinds of medals and pins with sputniks aso. In the beginning they were told that some expenses they will have to cover from their own per diem but then the Director of BENOTO took all expenses on himself hinting that their per diem they should use to buy something for their families.

(Considering ,however, the fact that they had to report that to their Embassy ,it is doubtful if they could benefit from their per diem.)

The Sovs were very much interested not only in their professional business but also asked many questions about recent socio-economic developments in France and in the West in general, particularly about present structure of capitalist economy, the enterprise and relations between the firm and workers, distribution of profits, living standard of different social classes, and Western life in general.

They were quite impressed with what they saw and heard and it was obvious that their knowledge and image of the Western economies and socio-economic relations were not only outdated but simply wrong and they realized it.

They were, however, very careful not to induldge into any discussion of Soviet problems and always tried to skip them altogether with banal generalities or silence. They refused also to give their addresses and were not keen on any private correspondence. Asked about address and staying in contact for the future they quite explicitly implied that they are interested only in official correspondence with the Firm.

They also kept at together in spite of BENOTO-people to separate them for private talk. Even in shops they stuck together. Only once, in STRASSBOURG, on 7 Dec Prof BULICHOV "dared to go for a drink with the Source and RICOUARD to a bar without any of his collegue and in pite of the fact that SMORODINOV refused Source's invitation to all of them, explaining that they are tired and have much to do. All the others always complied with SMORODINOV'S "opinion".

Although Prof BULICHOV was scientific chairman of the delegation and its head, the real chief was SMORODINOV and the latter decided on everything. BULICHOV himself referred all problems to SMORODINOV. The latter kept the watch over the others permanently, restricted their "beyond-business" movements and on their last day was the only one called to the Embassy to report on their mission. Obviously, SMORODINOV was not liked by the others.

In formal and private talks they stressed their desire for peace, praised and urged peaceful coexsistence, and seemed to be quite genuine in it. They were professionals well paid, on good positions, typical high-technocrats, interested primarily in their jobs and peaceful evolution of the Soviet Union and of the world. Their comment on the news about Brunei was: "they (revolutionaries) should have tried to solve it somehow peacefully not by weapon". Even SMORODINOV did not protest and skipped usual phraseology he was availing himself of in other cases.

Actually he felt almost embarrassed for SMORODINOV'S refusal and understood that this was a very untactful faux pas. In the bar he told the Source: "You see, Smorodinov is still a very young man and he thinks that if he will drink a glass of cognac this will mean betrayal of his country".

Apparent age: 53-55, 5'7, grey hair, blond, blue-greenish eyes, chobby, potbelly, double chin, large longish intelligent face. Very sympathetic, intelligent, tactful, well educated, could be a typecal representitave of old-times progressive Russian intelligentsia. Speaks only Russian.

Russian, married Ø his wife is of Polish descent), mentioned one son aged 20 who was very much interested in modern music and asked him to bring modern records.

First time in France. Travelled much in the Soviet Union Also visited satellites. Has been to Prague.

7 Dec 1962 in STRASSBOURG came with the Source and RICOUARD alone to a bar after telling SMORODINOV and ethers that he was already old man and needed little sleep. Actually he felt almost embarrassed for SMORODINOV'S refusal and understood that this was a very untactful faux pas. In the bar he told the Source: "You see, Smorodinov is still a very young man and he thinks that if he will drink a glass of cognac this will mean betrayal of his country".

Prof B. was very much interested in recent developments of economic thought in the West, particularly in the French planification-system, organization of the enterprise, social relations etc. He was quite well read in philosophy and also asked the Source to explain to him recent trends in Western philosophy. Source's "lecture" on spiritual and materialist components of existence as opposit to extreme materialist school (Marxism) and extreme idealistic school (Kant, Nitzsche), seemed to have interested fascinated him although he did not try to comment on it. He only continued to put questions as though wanted to get mobe and more out of it.

His political convictions he described as "peaceful". De Gaulèe's concept of Europe up to Ural he commented with two words "very, very interesting". Seemed to be genuinely worried by Franco-German new alliance and saw a real threat in it for the Soviet Union.

Prof B criticized Stalin's "monumental architecture" and as an example of its waste and inefficiency mentioned the building in which he lived. 2/3 of this building are for "representation" (corridors, columns etc) and only the rest for dwelling. Furthermore, children cannot even play in this "representation" because it is administratively forbidden "to spoil it".

Otherwise, B. was very reluctant to talk about any Soviet topic and always evaded it with meaningless generalities. In presence of SMORODINOV he seemed to be somewhat restrained though the latter never dared to contradict him and kept selent.

Prof B. was delighted with French food and drinke (wines) and told Source that he was going to do quite a lot of shopping in Paris.

He smoked cigarettes, liked very much French "Marigni" and was simply fascinated with French petit argreent dejeuner which he promised to introduce to his house. He was also about to switch from cigarettes to pipe after he tried Source's "Clan". Consequently, the Source bought him a pipe and "Clan"tobaccof. Prof B recoprocated with "sputnik2, vodka, Soviet cigarettes (Troika) and sagrdinnes.

Prof's clothing was rather modest. He told the Source that he had a very nice apartment for himself and was very well off.
Once he said something to the effect that he had very much money but there was not much to do with it.

b/ SMORODINOV, fnu - an "employee" of the Institute of Frankxxxxxx Fundaments in MOSCOW, Pushkinska wul.

Russian, party-member, apparently KGB-officer, aged 36-38, administrative chief of the delegation; dark-brawøn hair combed straight back, long narrow face, 5%, slim, Armenian nose, wears glasses(myopic), of average intelligence, speaks English and broken French and German. He kept contact with the Soviet Embassy and reported on their mission last day before departure.xx

In 1960 he participated in the Congress on Mechanics of Soil in Paris and 4 or 5 years ago was also at the same Congress in Latin America.

S. was very much interested in biographic data of the Source,

tried to "isolate" him from others, once or twice even asked him to play chess with him (he is average player), and gave the Source a small chess-box "Aeroflot".

Rather low educated, somewhat nervous, talks like reading Pravda-leaders, impudent. Married.

c/ KORSUNSKYI, Efim (KORSUNSKY) - engineer, employee of the Ministry of Constructions of the Russian SFSR, in charge of control of fundaments. Lives in MOSCOW.

Ukrainian, stems from NOVO-UKRAINKA near ODESSA, speaks Ukrai= nian and Russian. Married.

Aged 55-60, practical engineer, an excellent specialist, pragmatist by nature, clever, intelligent, very cautious.

Square face, grey, strong, wears glasses, stout.

K. was mainly interested in the BENOTO and other French drilling methods, told the Source that he was going to check in how far their own system of hammering should discarded and in what fields. He was also interested in general organization of construction projects in the West. Claimed to be an adherent of hammering-method.

K. likes comfort, good food, has a car of his own and is a typical automobile-fan. He travels very much in the Soviet Union, and usually goes by his car to SOCHI, CREMEA and ODESSA for vacations. Actually, whenever he is near the Black Sea he drops in at Odessa to visit his relatives and his place of birth.

Avoided any political questions. Asked the Source whether he knew "Rushnychok"-song and "Reve ta stohne Dnipr shyrokyi". On this occasion they sang together thelatter and K. was quite satisfied. When the Source mentioned POPOVITCH, KORSUNSKYI stressed that P. was a Ukrainian indeed.

d/ <u>DULEEV</u>, fnu - an engineer from LENMOSTSTROI in LENINGRAD, specialist in bridge construction, Russian, stems from KURSK-region, speaks Russian and knows Ukrainian. Also speaks broken French (the only one who arrived with Russo-French dictionary). Knows many Ukrainian songs.

Aged 55, 5'8, full round face, stout, broad shoulders, blood.

Likes to eat a lot, was fascinated with French killer and

asked the Source to give him quite a few recipes of French dishes. Also he noted all good French and foreign wines. Was planning to buy "half of Paris" for his family.

Married, father of a son aged 21, for whom wanted to buy a special underwater masque with optical lenses. It took, however, 2 weeks to order them and he resigned from it.

D. was very much interested in French magazines (illustrated) and even bought himself a Frenchy a la "Playboy".

He escaped any political questions and seemed to be interested only in food, wine and good life. First time abroad and at once became a great admirer of France.

D. told the Source that he was the only one in the delegation that had a Lenin's premium and implied that "they in Moscow" will listen to his word.

e/ ABRAMOV, fru - engineer, employed with Projecting Bureau of the Institute of Fundaments, Academy of Constructions, in Moscow.

Russian, aged 38-40, ful round face, 5'9, stout, dark brown hair, combed straight back, light brown eyes, very gay. Married.

Knows only Russian, first time abroad, did not smoke, had some trouble with stomark, (was on diet), drank very little and only wine.

An expert in statics and dynamics calculations. Was sumprised when told that in France no single ,standard formulas are applied in statics. Also was very much interested in enterprise-organization in the West, distribution of profits, productivity incentives and factors etc., and asked many questions about life in general.

He is a passionate collector of stamps and coins. Source gave him series of French stamps and he reciprocated with French ones(sputnik-series). Did not want, however, to maintain contact with the Source in the future for philatelistic purposes.

At AIX asked Source whether French shops are always so full of everything or just only before Christmass. He was quite surprised when learned that there was xxwxxx the whole year through "too much of this junk on shelves."

f/ POKREVSKAYA, Natalia Alexandrovna - interpreter, employed with FNIMSfQMT, Bark, 5rywn Danskoi weggssgldsses: Aged 32-35, slim,

Divorcee, married second time, mother of two chidren-daughter and son, aged 9 and 12 respectively.

Speaks perfect French. However, she had some difficulties in technical terms in construction engineering and explained that she was an interpreter mainly in mechanical engineering.

Of above average intelligence. Likes to read French press. She was very much also interested in French fashion magazines. Planned to buy much toys and cloth for her children and a short leather overcoat for her second husband. (She divorced her first husband). Her second husband is an engineer in Moscow.

P. has a friend of Russian origin in PARIS and phoned her now for the first time from the city.

In general P. behaved like a very loyal, conscientious servant of her bosses, in this case of SMORODINOV.

Third time in Paris, with delegations.

- KHAZOVA, Irena Russian, French citizen, married, a secretary. In 1961 stayed for one month in Moscow at the French Exposition. Strong indications that she is working for FIS.

 Was very happy when she could not accompany the delegation. Also tried to get some information and addresses on other occasions but in vain.
