from the Soviet Central Committee.

We will never take part in any international meeting or any preparatory meeting for it which you call for the purpose of splitting the International Communist Movement" was one of the phrases in the Chinese letter. Another was: "We firmly believe that the day your so-called meeting takes place will be the day you step into your grave."

The Chinese letter dated July 28 and published by New China news agency, though seen by observers to be an open challenge to the Soviet leaders to acknowledge a split in the world communist movement, it showed the Chinese leaders as completely convinced that they have Mr. Baranovitch on the run and as determined to press home their attempt to take over the leadership of world communism.

The Chinese letter was divided into five parts and ran to 12,000 Chinese characters. It said that the Soviet Communist Party in the letter of July 15, laid down all divine organization as the international meeting of the fraternal parties of more than 100 countries.

This shows that you are determined to prepare and call such a meeting arbitrarily, unilaterally and illegally with the aim of effecting an open split in the International Communist Movement. You want to convene a mass assembly for a split rather than to succeed a minor schismatic gathering.

The letter said that there were some parties which "have openly in response to your bait but their number is dwindling." It continued:

Since there are only a few left whom you will be able to attract to your side. Otherwise, no doubt, you would like to see you not be alone in splitting from time immemorial. However, you are failing. #### CHINESE COMMUNISTS

If you do not call the masses people will say that you have failed. In the case of the Chinese communists, the smaller parties and you will be compelled to do call the meeting, but you will be forced in an impasse without allies and will be present with the others who have grave fears of consequences of a crisis of your own making.

The Chinese letter repeats Soviet charges that the Chinese communists made a pact in first agreeing to a meeting of international communists and subsequently opposing it. The Chinese position had consistently been that a conference of the international parties very carefully planned and the date should be no hurriedly decided in accordance to suit the International Communist movement.

It was the Soviet Party that had made a date for and convened the meeting and convened an international conference in a billeted like manner. On 10 February of this year, China had suggested the resumption of bilateral talk between the Chinese and Soviet Communist Parties (including the parties of Cuba, Japan, Italy, and France).

#### ALLIANCE WITH U.S.

The letter accused the Soviet Party of having in February sent a circular directed against the Chinese party and fraternal parties in a plot to impose collective measures

with the United States ruling clique, you can, wise men, and in partnership with United States imperialism to carry up the world and oppose the revolutionary struggles of the people of all countries.

The letter referred more than once to the Soviet Communist Party waving its baton and said it regarded all the fraternal parties as puppets qualified to move with a your command. It said that such puppets were permeated with the spirit of great power chauvinism and of a patriarchal father party.

It strongly reiterated charges that the present programme of the Soviet Communist Party was revisionist. It were the twentieth and twenty-second congresses of the Soviet Party in 1956 and 1961. It said that these two congresses, the first of which denounced Stalin and declared there was more than one road to socialism were the root cause of the present divisions within the International communist movement.

It also declared that the Soviet party, not the Chinese which had begun the policies and "kindled the fire." It said that the number of communists in the world who really believed in revisionism was only a small fraction and they were "bound to come to grief."

The letter concluded with an appeal addressed to "Dear Comrades" which said: "Once again we sincerely advise you to run in on the brink of the precipice and not to prize such false and useless face saving. But if you refuse to listen and are determined to take the road to doom, well, suit yourselves . . ." Reuter.

## Russia Accused Of ANTI-SEMITISM

GENEVA, July 30.—Israel today accused the Soviet Union of conducting a campaign of "racial assimilation" against the three million Jews living there with the aim of eliminating the Jewish national identity. Without mentioning the Soviet Union, the Israel delegate to the United Nations Economic and Social Council, Mr. M. Barur, expressed deepest anxiety at the situation of the largest Jewish community in Europe. The council was discussing the report of the United Nations committee on human rights.

Mr. Barur said anti-Semitism existed all over the world but in no country was it supported by official editors and papers there. He quoted several allegedly antisemitic books published recently in the Soviet Union but was interrupted by the Soviet delegate, Mr. V. N. Bendryshev, who accused him of making slanderous remarks and holding up the work of the council.

Mr. Bendryshev strongly rejected the Israel statement, and said that at the moment there were 92 synagogues in the Soviet Union. Mr. Barur replied that according to Soviet statistics presented to the United Nations in 1956 there had been 140 synagogues in the Soviet Union.

## NEW MOSCOW RADIO SERVICE

Moscow Radio will introduce a 24-hour continuous service of news, comments, and music for its home listeners from August 1, according to the latest issue of Radio Programs (radio programmes), published by Moscow. This will be called the Mayak (Beacon) service and will be broadcast on short, long, and medium waves, thus making it audible all over the Soviet Union and in many parts of the outside world, the magazine declared.

Mayak replaces the Moscow Radio home service's second programme which could not be heard throughout the Soviet Union and abroad because it was broadcast only on long and medium waves. It will also

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
