1. Subject visited Dr Kl at her home from 10.30 to 14.15 hrs on 19 Jan 1965.

2. Subject tried to chide Kl's friends as cowards for their not coming to the party at the Mission on 13 Jan 1965. Dr Kl explained that no one was a coward and the matter was more complex. Her friends from the Round Table Club wanted to see first some changes in Ukraine before they showed any further goodwill on their part.

In Subject's opinion the whole idea of putting demands and Kl's contacts with political groups was no good. She would do better by staying aloof from all political groups and continuing ~~work~~ on her own. This was particularly important for people in the Ukraine whom she will meet. As long as she represents no one but herself, they (the people in Ukraine) will trust her and show her more than to others. He knows that from his own experience. During his last trips to Ukraine many people in the Ukraine - scholars, high party officials and others - showed all kind of materials that could not be yet published but they exist and many people read them. There were not only poems and literary works but also memos on education, publishing practices etc.

She should also have nothing to do with those who want to separate Ukraine from Russia. Any connection with those people will automatically bind her and restrict her moves in the Ukraine. No one will trust her on official side. No one will show her any secret documents or anything like it and she will lose quite a lot.

3. According to Subject the emigration knows nothing about what is going on in the Ukraine "under surface". Young generation makes a great job, they think more freely, and they have great gains. But they do all that within official framework, they are communists, and don't like rotten emigres. The day is not far when in all Ukrainian cities Ukrainian will sound widely in the streets. Things are improving. Of course, there is pressure from Moscow but at the same time there is even a stronger counter-pressure. Read carefully Soviet youth magazines. Read particularly "Znania". There are already some portents of what is to come.

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In many cases Russians are already helpless. Take as an example the removal of LAZORENKO from the post of Rector of Lviv-University. And what have they gained? The present Rector turned out even greater Ukrainian than the former.

4. Kl and her friends should support Subject's paper (Hromadskiy Holos) by printing there their articles. He tried to convince D. Kl that there was no need for any "new" free press and they should use for that purpose "Hromadskiy Holos".
