1. On 1 Jan 1966, late afternoon early evening. Subject visited Dr Kl and brought the gifts for her from <sup>Katerina</sup> KOLOSSOVA ( ~~person~~, carved picture, and greeting letter). He told Dr Kl the following:

a/ There is "a deep fermentation" going on at high party echelons, both in Kiev and in Moscow. A tug-of-war was very intensive in Kiev between those who were in favor of at least partial Ukrainization and those who are against it. The former are also for development of further cultural contacts with emigration "exactly on the basis of Dr Kl's and her friends' demands at least to some extent". <sup>Lake</sup> PALAMARCHUK <sup>201-45662</sup> was one of them and evidently was demoted to Morocco for pushing too hard Dr Kl's line.

Nevertheless there are also other people who sustain this line. Therefore Dr Kl should go as soon as possible to Kiev and talk to <sup>Mike T.</sup> TRONKO <sup>201-724491</sup> and other people. Subject is sure that just <sup>she</sup> she has convinced TRONKO and CHERNIAVSKY and others she will be able to do the same with people in Kiev and Moscow. She will talk with SECHERBYTSKYI, SHELEST, PODGORNYY and if they won't help then PODGORNYY will take her to BREZHNEV himself.

In Subject's opinion the high party echelons are quite numerously staffed with Ukrainians at the present and Dr Kl should take advantage of this fact. Who knows how long this situation will last and Dr Kl would do right by not waiting too long with her trip to Kiev. Her main mission is to help those in Kiev who are in favor of further developing of contacts with Ukrainian emigration, and introducing of Ukrainization.

b/ TRONKO was very much impressed by what he was told and saw in the States and Canada. He came to check on up-to-date-developments and returned to Kiev with strong conviction that "something must be done".

2. Subject asked Dr Kl whether she would like to print anything in his paper, "also without her signature". He was ready to publish anything she wanted, particularly if she wanted to say something about the Patriarchate, and similar topics. Dr Kl thanked him but refused to take advantage of his offer.

3. According to Subject the people in Kiev definitely trust Dr Kl's sincere intentions but they still might think that she could have some contacts with "other people". And he was sure that Dr Kl would disperse all the suspicions.
