They are authors of an article "Sperechaimosia z po-naukovomu!" in Literaturna Ukraina of 27 Aug 1965 in which they are defending Mykhailo Kesiv's critique of Prof. Yu.Kobeletskyi's book "Shevchenko-Franko" published in 1964. Kosiv's critique entitled Perehuk Geniyiv ... chy Perekruchennia Faktiv? and published in Zhovten , March 1965, castigated quite strongly Kobyletskyi for neglecting in his book national, traditional, Ukrainian aspects in Franko's writings on Shevchenko, Ukrainian and Russian literature aso. Kosiv's article is not only "to the point" kut in general but also quite 'controversial" as against official obey-the-line attitude on this subject.

2. According to the letter of R.Gen.-Ber. of Prague to her brother-in-law

"she does not think KOROTYCH is such a good poet as some people write
about him" and besides " some Ukrainian poets need not only talent
but character and integrity as well". Korotych is one of them.

In his letter to Ch., New York, N.Y. dtd 20 Mar 1966, KOROTYCH writes that he will probably give up his medical practice at least for a time because "it's physically impossible" to **x** do all things at once." At the present he continues to work on translation of Eliot. He also mentions that he would like to see Chinks and "maybe he will". This sentence Ch. interprets as an indication that he might be coming soon to the States. KOROTYCH wrote in similar fashion shortly before his arrival to Canada.

He mentions nothing about armsts.

3. P.KARADASH of 26 Sefton St., Pascoe Vale, Victoria, Australia was corresponding for several months with Kiev Film Studio Dovzhenka asking them to send him the film "Son" (The Dream). They were making promises all the time but did not send the film. Finally KARDASH wrote

to BREZHNEV complaining that he had seen in his life at least 10 countries but nowhere there seemed to be such disorders as in the Soviet Union. He could not imagine how a socialist Ukrainian state claiming to be souvereign and aso asf could not evem export a fixed Ekrainian film. In Feb 1966, three weeks later he received a reply and the film "Son" from Kiev which will be his own for \$800.-.

If he wants to have English subtitles he would have to pay L 400.- additionally. Kiev's reply was full of apologies and assurances that they would gladly meet any requests he should have.
