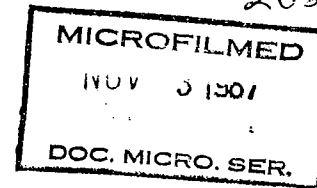

MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD

SUBJECT: Meeting with AECASSOWARY/2 and 29 in Washington on 12 September 1967 (Meeting held at Holiday Inn, Rosslyn Circle)

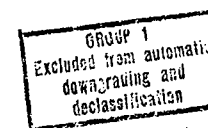
Among other matters concerning intellectual dissent covered in separate memos the following was discussed:

1. Ya. HAYVAS told A/2 his organization received a Soviet document, on tapes, which, from some of the things he mentioned, would seem to be another copy of the Chornovil document received by A/2 in July of this year. The tapes were supposed to be given to Daria SIYAK by SVITLYCHNYY, when the former was in the Soviet Union in July, but for some reason SVITLYCHNYY changed his mind at the last moment and did not give them to her. A/2 will get more information about the document when he sees HAYVAS in person. PROCYK

2. S. PROCYK, 5219 N. Warwick Street, Philadelphia, who is trying to bring his parents over from the Soviet Union, received a letter, postmarked 17 August in Montreal, (copy attached) from a Volodymyr Hryhorovych LNU, in which it was suggested that PROCYK come to Montreal and meet with him on 17 or 18 September on board the Soviet ship, A. Pushkin. Volodymyr states that he was asked to meet with PROCYK by Andriy Yosypovich PASHUK, the lawyer who is handling matters concerned with the immigration of PROCYK's parents. PROCYK told A/2 he planned to make the contact and, at the recommendation of A/2, that he would notify the FBI of his plans prior to his departure for Montreal. Mykhaylo

3. Evhen STAKHIV talked with LEVISCHENKO in Montreal on 15 August. He was introduced to LEVISCHENKO by ~~fnuk~~ YAKIMENKO, member of the Ukrainian directorate at Expo-67, and who seemed to be senior to LEVISCHENKO as STAKHIV put it - in the KGB. STAKHIV expressed the opinion that contacts with the Ukraine at the present were very bad and that LEVISCHENKO was at fault. He said he wanted to talk to P. TRONKO about the situation but LIT. USSR

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LEVISCHENKO said it would not be possible. In their discussion concerning the probability of an amnesty this year, LEVISCHENKO said there probably would be an amnesty but that no official list of those affected would be available and that not all individuals would be affected. LEVISCHENKO wanted to know all about the coming congress of free Ukrainians and asked whether a Soviet Ukrainian delegation would be welcome. LEVISCHENKO told STAKHIV to feel free to write to him if he could be of any service. When the latter said he would contact CHERNYAVSKY in New York should he want anything, LEVISCHENKO was infuriated and assured STAKHIV that CHERNYAVSKY has no authority. LEVISCHENKO telephoned Vera SHUMEYKO from Montreal. She travelled there to visit him. She has received her Soviet visa, probably after SHEVEL's okay.

4. YAREMKO told KLACHKO he talked with KRAVETS at the Soviet mission on 7 and 8 September. KRAVETS was in charge during SHEVCHENKO's absence. YAREMKO told KLACHKO he learned the following from KRAVETS: K. KOLOSOVA ~~has been dismissed from~~ her chairmanship of the Soviet Ukrainian Committee for cultural contacts and replaced by A. I. MELINA, a "high KGB officer" because of her sentimentality toward the emigres in her contact operations, that most of those with whom she had developed contact were also in contact with the CIA and the FBI. ~~Reportedly, other individuals also will go.~~ YAREMKO said he agreed with KRAVETS that, under present circumstances, all politics should be avoided and contacts should stress culture and trade. In this regard, he was planning to convert his firm into a cooperative and turn the commercial aspect of it over to two individuals, one of whom lives on 1st Avenue in New York and another in Philadelphia. He himself will concentrate on the cultural aspect. YAREMKO said he discussed his plan with KRAVETS, who was in favor of it, and that he would also discuss it with SHEVCHENKO. YAREMKO told KLACHKO she made a big mistake in not going to the Ukraine this summer. He also proposed that KLACHKO intercede for him with the U.S. Department of State to obtain permission to undertake the activities of an impresario. He hopes to make arrangements for 12 concerts in 1968.

YAREMKO said KRAVETS knew about the misunderstanding between Evhen STAKHIV and Valentyn NOVYTSKY, and that he hoped they could settle their differences. KRAVETS would like to see the Round Table club reorganized to include individuals not connected with political parties in the emigration so that contacts between the club and Soviet Ukrainians could continue.

CHERNYAVSKY probably will leave for Kiev in the near future.

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His departure is somehow connected with the disfavor into which KOLOSOVA has fallen.

5. A/33 talked with Oles' HONCHENKO at Expo-67. The latter confirmed that there had been demonstrations in Kiev on 22 May. HONCHAR has been defending Ivan DZYUBA right along, and will prevent the arrest of anyone in the Ukrainian Union of Writers as long, as he is chairman.

6. A Fnu BONDAR, of the Soviet Embassy in Washington, who talked with Roman MAC in Montreal, pleaded with the latter for Ukrainian emigres not to do anything to mar Ukrainian Day at Expo. He said it was to the benefit of both Soviets and emigres for Ukrainian Day to go off well.
