2. Description of Activity:

Project AERODYNAMIC is the principal vehicle through which SB Division conducts its operations against the Ukrainian Soviet Socialist Republic. The main purpose of the project is to exploit contacts with Soviet Ukrainian citizens in order to encourage national and intellectual unrest in the Ukrainian SSR, thus encouraging cultural and intellectual freedom for Soviet citizens. CIA has been in contact with the ZP/UHVR (Foreign Representation of the Ukrainian Supreme Liberation Council) since 1950. Anti-Soviet propaganda activities were begun from New York by a panel of the ZP/UHVR in 1953, and continued until the recent Katzenbach guidelines required that the group no longer publish, be funded, or be organizationally based in the United States. All publications, with the exception of the Information Bulletin, now originate in Europe.

3. Funding:

Until the MNDOWEL flap, Prolog Research and Publishing Association, Inc., the non-profit, tax-exempt cover company for the ZP/UHVR's activities, was funded through the [] [], a legal entity established by CIA. Funds were made available to the Munich branch office through bank transfers from New York.

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Under the new arrangement, Prolog Research and Publishing Association, Inc. has been legally liquidated and the New York office has been reconstituted as a profit-making commercial enterprise entitled Prolog Research Corporation which will do no publishing. All publishing activities have been moved to the Munich office, the Ukrainische Gesellschaft fur Auslandsstudien E.V. Both Prolog and the Munich office will be funded from Headquarters via [] banks. Final details concerning the funding and the relationships between Prolog and the Munich office are still being worked out with CCS and the Finance Division.

4. Interagency Coordination and Approval:

On 30 October 1967, the 303 Committee held up approval pending a review of the project by Ambassador McGhee in Germany. The Ambassador approved on 17 November 1967. The 303 Committee again reviewed on 1 December 1967 and (a) approved continuation of CIA's relationship to Prolog subject to annual review of Prolog's value and effectiveness; (b) approved the merger of Prolog's activities with Suchasnist in Munich, and the continued residence of certain Prolog personnel in the United States; (c) took note of the fact that Prolog publications will continue to find a limited market in the United States. Deputy Assistant Secretary of State briefed, in November 1967. ZP/UHVR collaborators who contact Soviet diplomatic and United Nations personnel are either advised to report their contacts to the FBI or the contact is coordinated with the FBI through the project case officer.

EVALUATORY COMMENT:

1. In the light of the intellectual ferment in the USSR during the last year and the recent events in Czechoslovakia, little need be said in justification of the activities carried on as part of Project AERODYNAMIC. It is obviously essential that the Agency have as many lines of contact into dissident groups in the USSR as possible, both for information purposes and to support their activities wherever possible. The contacts of the collaborators of the ZP/UHVR with Soviet officials and citizens both abroad and in the USSR number in the hundreds per year. AERODYNAMIC publications stimulate the Ukrainian exile community and provide the excuse and vehicle for increased contacts with Ukrainians within the USSR. One major result in the last year has been the considerable acquisition of "protest documents" circulating in the USSR. Increased costs of the project this year (in excess of funds programmed), in fact, have been due to the expenses of reprinting and publicizing these documents.

2. The problems caused the project by the MHDOWEL flap seen now almost completely resolved. All publishing activities have now been moved outside the United States with the exception of the Information Bulletin which is a Ukrainian-language newsletter mailed directly to the USSR and Poland with no distribution in the West. Legal requirements regarding the reorganization of the New York office have been completed, and the next year should be free of troublesome organizational matters.

3. CCS/PRG concurred without comment.

4. Recommend approval.

SUBJECT: Renewal of Project AERODYNAMIC (SB Division)

REFERENCE: My memorandum for you, dated 26 January 1968,
same subject

1. Since this project was reviewed last time, evidence of unrest in the Soviet Ukraine and of increasingly harsh repression and persecution of Ukrainian dissidents, mainly nationalist intellectuals, has further increased. Moreover, project personnel, as noted in para E of the renewal request, have gotten numerous documents of Ukrainian dissidence to the West and the free-world press is taking notice of these developments in the Ukraine on a rising scale. Under these circumstances, continuation of the project and the proposed moderate budget increase are fully justified.

2. We welcome transfer of most publishing activities from the U.S. to Munich (para C-2, renewal request) as an important move in the right direction. The necessary search for younger replacements for the elderly agent personnel of the project (para H-1) has apparently not yet been successful: it ought to be pressed with all practicable speed, to maintain the capabilities of the project facing the potentialities referred to in para 1 above.

3. The publishing and mailing activities of the project are described with commendable detail in para G and attachment 7 of the renewal request.

4. Recommendations. In view of the above, I recommend that ADDP

- a. renew the project in the proposed amount;
- b. with reference to para B-3 of the renewal request -- "Project AERODYNAMIC" represents

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national and intellectual unrest through publications and through contacts with Soviet citizens, and to exert pressure on the Soviet regime, through these activities, for greater national and intellectual freedom in the Soviet Ukraine.

2. The ZP/UHVR is uniquely qualified to accomplish the stated objectives. It represents a channel of political and cultural influence to Ukrainians in the Soviet Union from several million Ukrainian emigres all over the world. Its publications serve to keep ZP/UHVR alive as an influential political force and as a center around which they can work toward the dissemination of pro-Western ideological and anti-communist material. ZP/UHVR's political philosophy remains sufficiently liberal so that Soviet Ukrainians are willing to talk to its members and to its collaborators; and Soviet Ukrainian officials, by trying to court and influence ZP/UHVR collaborators, have recognized the effectiveness of ZP/UHVR activities.

3. Project AERODYNAMIC represents CIA's only project specifically concerned with any minority nationality in the Soviet Union. Little would have been known in the West about the flare-up of resistance to Soviet Russian dominance in the Ukraine in the past several years and about the widespread persecution and arrests of Soviet Ukrainian intellectuals were it not for ZP/UHVR efforts.

C. CHANGES

1. To comply with the instructions of the DCI, the Prolog Research and Publishing Association, Inc., a non-profit tax exempt membership corporation used as the cover mechanism under Project AERODYNAMIC, is in the process of being liquidated. All the necessary legal steps have been accomplished, and we are awaiting final approval of the dissolution from the New York Secretary of State. This is now merely a routine action expected to be accomplished in the next few days.* The cover mechanism is now operating as a profit-making, commercial taxable enterprise, under the interim name of Suchasnist Corporation. Immediately following approval of the liquidation of Prolog Research and Publishing Association, Inc., by the New York Secretary of State, the organization will then operate under the name of Prolog Research Corporation. The retention of "Prolog" was felt desirable because of the prestige the name has acquired over the years among Soviet Ukrainian intellectuals and in the emigre community.

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2. Under the new arrangement, Prolog will no longer be engaged in publishing activities. The project's publishing activities have been moved to Munich. Prolog Research Corporation's profits ostensibly will come from research contracts to be fulfilled for non-specified users in the Western world, and it will be subsidized by a private donor or donors. The name of the donor(s) would be revealed only in the case of emergency needs. In the past the Munich office, the Ukrainische Gesellschaft fur Auslandsstudien E.V., was funded via Prolog. Under the new arrangement, both Prolog and the Munich office will be funded from headquarters via [redacted] banks. Prolog will set up a [redacted] account into which CIA will channel the necessary funds from another [redacted] bank for the Munich office. Remaining details concerning the overt relationship between Prolog and the Ukrainische Gesellschaft fur Auslandsstudien E.V. (the Munich Office) are being worked out with CCS and the Finance Division.

3. The Administrative Plan for Project AERODYNAMIC has been revised to reflect the reconstitution of the cover organization to a new profit-making corporate entity, the Prolog Research Corporation.

D. INTELLIGENCE PRODUCTION

The collection of positive intelligence is a secondary aim of Project AERODYNAMIC, which is basically a CA project. There were 6 formal disseminations of positive intelligence in FY-1968. A far greater FI contribution is made by the project in the form of biographical, behavioural and personality information on Soviet citizens.

E. EFFECTIVENESS

1. In evaluating the usefulness of Project AERODYNAMIC in past years the question which always persisted was how do we know how much of the propaganda distributed by the project actually reaches its destination, what impact does it have, if any, and whether any of the national sentiments it tends to encourage do actually exist at all. Numerous documents brought out to the West in the past three years have made clear that there is intensive resentment on the part of Soviet Ukrainian intellectuals toward the repressive policies coming from Moscow and that this resentment has been developing over a long time. Many more documents not yet surfaced have been brought out to the West via AERODYNAMIC assets, which give evidence of the scope of the ferment in the Ukraine.

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2. As a result of documents made available by the project, over 50 items dealing with Ukrainian dissidence have appeared in the non-Ukrainian Western press in the past six months. The project has arranged publication in English, French, and Ukrainian of a blistering attack against Russification in the Ukraine by Ivan Dzyuba, a very outspoken Ukrainian literary critic. This document, which has been circulating in manuscript form in the Ukraine, is the most logical, thoroughly documented, and telling condemnation yet seen of Moscow's Russification policies in the Ukraine. (The English edition, which has just appeared in London, is already generating comment in the press.) It is one of three documents referred to by Vsevolod I. Yushko, Third Secretary of the Soviet Embassy in Ottawa, when he called on a Canadian official of Ukrainian birth in early March of this year to warn him against raising such documents at the Human Rights Conference in Teheran. Yushko further warned the Canadian official to withdraw from his involvement in the publicizing of such material in the West.

3. At least 20 other documents brought to the West by Prolog collaborators, and which either have been surfaced or are being prepared for surfacing, attest to a preoccupation on the part of Soviet Ukrainian citizens with the nationality problem and to a wave of opposition in the Ukrainian SSR to Moscow's Russification policies and to intellectual suppression in the Soviet Union. Three of the documents contain evidence that a movement had been initiated by a group of Soviet Ukrainian intellectuals, mostly lawyers, to test the Ukraine's Constitutional right to secession from the Soviet Union. Speaking to a conference of Kiev province communists on 16 February 1968, the Ukrainian Communist Party leader, Petro Shelest, denounced demands for independence for the Ukraine as "twaddle", and asked for efforts to counter nationalism in the Ukraine. He accused Ukrainian emigres of seeking to foster bourgeois nationalism in the Ukraine. In letters received by Radio Liberty from Soviet Ukrainians their nationalism is expressed in various ways. For example, in a letter dated 28 November 1967, the writer speaks about the "accursed occupation exerting all its strength to crush everything that is Ukrainian and russifying the Ukrainian people."

4. It has become almost accepted practice for Soviet Ukrainian intellectuals visiting in the New York area to contact Prolog collaborator Dr. Maria Klachko (Ph.D) an American free lance writer of Ukrainian descent who lives and works in New York City. As circumstances permit she entertains

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her Soviet visitors and invites other Prolog collaborators in the Ukrainian emigre intellectual community to meet them. Many of her contacts with the visiting Soviets are arranged through the First Secretary of the Soviet Ukrainian permanent U.N. delegation, Yuri Kochubey, with whom Dr. Klachko has developed a fairly close relationship. Dr. Klachko has frequent contact with Kochubey and his wife, as she did with Kochubey's predecessor, Victor Chernyavsky and his wife. She also has attended receptions at the Soviet Ukrainian Mission in New York, and has met Sergei Shevchenko, the head of the Mission, and other Soviet officials. The KGB is certainly aware of her widespread contacts with Soviet Ukrainians, but nevertheless they continue, and the Soviets seem to have accepted her as a link between themselves and Ukrainian emigre intellectuals. Dr. Klachko's activities produce useful biographic and assessment data on individual Soviets, as well as background data on attitudes, impact of particular project publications, and Soviet reactions to current events.

5. Because the majority of Prolog collaborators are from among the intellectual community there very frequently is an appropriate asset to utilize in contacting a visiting or PCS Soviet citizen in a corresponding profession. For example, a young poetess and university lecturer in South America was used to establish contact with Soviet Ukrainian writers when she represented her country at an international meeting. She continues to maintain her contacts and has been a link in the exchange of information and literature and in getting documents to the West; a Latin American university professor and international lawyer has been utilized in contacts during his attendance at international law conferences and at the Human Rights Conference in Tehran where he is officially representing his country. The number of such Prolog collaborators has grown from year to year, and they are available to take advantage of any opportunities which may arise for contacts with Soviet Ukrainians.

G. EVALUATION OF PUBLICATIONS

1. Project AERODYNAMIC's publishing activity in the United States ceased as of the first of the year 1968. All project literature, with the exception of the Information Bulletin, is now published in Europe. The Information Bulletin is a small (8 1/2" x 6 1/2") publication of about 7 pages. It is printed on lightweight paper, the front page sometimes hand-written to give it the appearance of a personal letter. It is a Ukrainian-language publication directed specifically at Soviet Ukrainians and mailed in letter-size envelopes to Ukrainians in the Soviet Union and in Poland at the rate of about 1,000 copies monthly, from about 10 different

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Western countries. The last page of the bulletin carries the information that the bulletin is printed by the press section of the ZP/UHVR. No copies of the bulletin are made available in the West.

2. Suchasnist, ZP/UHVR's major publication, continues to be the most outstanding Ukrainian-language emigre journal. There is evidence from conversations with Soviet citizens that it is widely read by Ukrainian intellectuals in the UkSSR. Suchasnist has been used for surfacing Soviet documents and for introducing Soviet writers to the Ukrainian emigration, as well as for popularizing Ukrainian emigre writers and introducing them to the Soviet Ukrainian readers. Not a political party organ, Suchasnist appeals to a wide audience. Details concerning the distribution of Suchasnist are given in Attachment 7. It appears monthly.

3. Ukrainskyy Samostiynyk, a monthly journal which is influenced to a large extent by the ZP/UHVR, and includes contributions from ZP/UHVR collaborators, comments more than does Suchasnist on the political aspects of Ukrainian life in the Soviet Union and on the Ukrainian emigration. It is a monthly organ of a splinter Ukrainian emigre organization, the OUNz (Organization of Ukrainian Nationalists/Foreign Representation), which is partially supported (\$3900. annually) from project funds. See Attachment 7 for details on distribution.

4. The Digest of the Soviet Ukrainian Press, although published in English, like other project publications is printed and distributed from Munich. It is the only digest of the Soviet Ukrainian press in existence in the West, and its cost to the project is approximately \$4510. annually. It is a by-product of ZP/UHVR's daily research on the Soviet press. This publication, as described by its title, is merely a translation of excerpts from the Soviet Ukrainian press, publisher's comments being a rare exception. It is mailed to Western subscribers for a subscription rate of \$15.00 annually, or \$30.00 for three years, and its purpose is to bring to the attention of its readers news items not included in the Digest of the Soviet Press.

A french-language edition of the Digest, Echos d'Ukraine, is compiled and published in Paris by a ZP/UHVR collaborator, and is mailed from Paris at the rate of about 800 copies monthly to French scholars, students from French-speaking areas and to French-speaking individuals in the newly developed areas. Total cost to the Project is \$4975 per year, which includes payment for all other services performed

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by the collaborator in Paris. Unlike the English-language Digest, Echos d'Ukraine carries commentary on the Soviet press and on current events in the Soviet Union.

5. In past years references to AERODYNAMIC special publications and to Suchasnist were made from time to time in the Soviet press and by Soviet citizens with whom there was contact. Individual Soviet Ukrainians usually speak of the publications in a favorable way, while official references are mostly derogatory, as might be expected. Soviet documents brought out in the past two years have confirmed that AERODYNAMIC literature was finding its way to the target audience and that it was disturbing to Soviet authorities. In his closing statement during a secret trial by the Lvov Oblast Court on 16 April 1966, psychologist Mykhaylo Horyn' referred to some of the documents confiscated from him during his arrest in his home in 1965. Among the literature to which he referred were the following publications, all of which were produced and distributed by Prolog: Origins of Ukrainian Law (pocket book), Contemporary Literature in the UKSSR (pocket book), and Ukrainian Education in a Chauvinistic Vise (pocket book). In his letter to the Procurator of the Ukrainian SSR, the writer M.S. Masyutko, recalled among other literature confiscated from him, the following, which also were distributed by Prolog: On the Occasion of Pogruzhalsky's Trial (pamphlet); R, Rakhmanny's article, To the Writer Iryna Wilde and Her Countrymen Who Do Not Fear The Truth (pamphlet); Ukrainian Education in a Chauvinistic Vise (pocket book); the address delivered by former president Dwight D. Eisenhower at the unveiling of Taras Shevchenko's monument in Washington, D.C. (pamphlet); and A Reply to the Cultural Leaders of the Ukrainian SSR from the Ukrainian Cultural Leaders in Canada and the USA (pamphlet).

The Ukrainianistics scientific research section of the Department of Philosophy, University of Presov in Czechoslovakia wrote in January of this year requesting, on an exchange basis, Prolog's "serious scholarly work with which we are familiar", and letters have been received by Prolog from Polish Universities acknowledging receipt of and thanking Prolog for books which are placed in their libraries for use by Soviet Ukrainian students studying or visiting in Poland.

6. In Attachment 4 there is detailed information concerning the publication costs of special books and publications. Distribution costs are shown in attachment 7.

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H. PROBLEMS

1. As with any organization based on the World War II emigration, the need to find younger replacements for aging personnel is a problem which becomes more pressing with each passing year. The principal agent is himself concerned about this and is actively seeking young men (such as AECASSOWARY/29, the present "operations officer" who joined Prolog in 1960) who have the intellectual and personal qualifications required, and the political dedication to work for lower salaries than they could command elsewhere.

2. At present the West German government tolerates the presence and activities of the ZP/UHVR, as well as other emigre groups. However, the Germans appear to be taking generally more interest than previously in the activities of political groups operating on their territory. To date, this interest has not been at all hostile; official inquiries so far were mainly concerned with whether the ZP/UHVR conducts "manifestations and demonstrations." (It does not.) We cannot rule out the possibility of a future change in political climate in West Germany, though, leading to a less hospitable atmosphere for such activities. At present we are watching for signs of further interest in the ZP/UHVR on the part of the German authorities, and feel we will have ample lead time to plan any changes which may be required.

J. INTERAGENCY COORDINATION

1. The project was reviewed on 1 December 1967 by the 303 Committee, which (a) approved continuation of CIA's relationship to Prolog on the understanding that this decision will be subject to annual review of Prolog's value and effectiveness; (b) approved the merger of Prolog's activities with Suchasnist in Munich, and the continued residence of certain Prolog personnel in the United States; (c) took note of the fact that Prolog publications will continue to find a limited market in the United States.

2. The American Ambassador (Ambassador McGhee) in Bonn was briefed on the project and the proposed changes on 17 November 1967. He agreed to the changes proposed. The German Station is being kept informed of the changes affecting the Munich office.

3. The Deputy Assistant Secretary of State was briefed

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in November 1967 on the activities of the project and reviewed the paper prepared for the 303 Committee.

4. ZP/UHVR collaborators who contact Soviet diplomatic and United Nations personnel are either advised to report their contacts to the Federal Bureau of Investigation or the contact is coordinated with the FBI through the project case officer.

K. PLANS

It is planned to continue in Germany existing ZP/UHVR publications and the publication of special books and pamphlets for distribution to Soviet citizens. Contact operations against Soviet citizens also will continue to be directed from the New York office.

L. COSTS

The \$[] requested for FY 1969 represents a \$[] increase over the amount programmed for FY 1968. The organization operated at approximately this higher level of expenditure in FY 1968 even though its subsidy in FY 1968 only amounted to \$[]. This was made possible because there was a rather large cash carry-over from FY 1967. The additional level of expenditure throughout 1968 and which we propose to continue in FY 1969 represents the project's response to the rising tide of intellectual dissidence and to the increased evidence of nationalistic activity in the Ukrainian SSR. The project has expanded its contacts with Ukrainians and other Soviet citizens in the satellite areas and abroad, but most of the added cost is for stepped-up publishing activity. This publishing activity is almost exclusively devoted to documents of protest and dissent which have been and are being generated by the Soviet Ukrainian dissidents themselves. We feel that the additional funds are required for effective exploitation of the present situation.
