

1. The Joint Center had all of SHUBA 810's original letters and envelopes analyzed last October, in order to determine whether or not the same individual had written all the correspondence. Through an oversight, we neglected to send you our technicians' report, which was as follows:

> "The systematic investigation of the seventeen pieces of writing lead us to believe that all are written by the same person. As is to be seen from the attached chart the chosen characters A, B, D, etc., all have a basic character form, as is proved in the case of letter 2 and 6 which have the most different writing style. Although the writer has been extremely clever and has various styles of writing, certain overall uniformities exist throughout, which can be seen in making the chart comparisons."

(We have not reproduced the chart, since it merely points out similarities in certain key letters.)

2. Inasmuch as reference cable mentions three overt letters which were not included in the above study, we agree with you that a thorough analysis is advisable. Under separate cover, therefore, we are sending you Letters Nos. 1 to 6, Letter No. 11, a postcard, and Letters Nos. 14 to 19. We believe the gap between Nos. 6 and 11 came about through SHUBA 810's failure to number his letters at the beginning. Letters Nos. 12, 13 and 14 were apparently never received.

3. We shall be interested in receiving your report as seen as the analysis is completed. We should also like to have the original letters returned to us in order to keep our files intact.
