- 1. On 30 May STIRANT-1 reported that his wife had, unlimited, nortwed in Tokyo and contested him through a material friend, one (SHIROTH Region). (1616/1816/5197/1002). STRAFF-1 explained to [_] that he realised there wight be some object tions to having his wife and children join him, but he too wanted this requires and placeded with the case officer to allow him to have like wife and children at his wide. When the case officer displayed some relations to great this request the agent adved if he could have the wife play with him for a short period of time. The problem of the exclusion would not have to be notified with the end of August when their mineal year cuded.

STRANG-1 painted out that if the orga his seculation to have his family with his his wife would not offer a great problem - even though she has been using the agent's brue name living in Byushu, she could easily assume STHAME-1's entropy identify however, the children, both of then are ald enough to be every of a ster, present another problem. The agent stated that 15 would be a impossible for them to semme another identity, not only from their point of view, but also because of school records, birth certification, etc., STHANT-1 suggested that he be allowed to resum his true name and to Sade back into Japanese society. The case officer raised the question of his present Chinese identity and documentation and asked what would happen if the agent were to change at this time. STERANT-1 replied that his corrunt registration was valid for one year from date of Laure (15 May 1955) and that the imageration authorities would not be commerced about IMMERS A until the certificate of residence had ampired and by that he symbol. fult that he would be so buried that there would be little or no danger that amone could the IDENTITY B, his true none, with that of IDENTITY A.
- 5. The ease officer also pointed out that if STEANT-1 test up his true name this organization could no larger give him cover employment and that from an operational point of view the security risks in meeting the agent would be greatly increased. In reply to ______ first statement the agent replied that he was seare that the organization could no larger opened him and that he would be forced to find other cover employment. In reply to _____ second statement the agent said that he realized that the security risks would be increased and, in part, to minimise these risks he could remove himself from the fante area during the critical period of reestablishing himself under the name INSTITY 3.
- 6. After the above convergation [] tald the agent that he would like to have some time to consider the many problems which his requests brought up before attempting to render a decision to the question, which stated in its simplest form is: Will this organization allow STMANT-1 to remain his brue mane and to consent to the agent's family rejoining him? If it is considered that the granting of STMANT-1's requests is too misky the case efficer could simply inform the agent of this decision and dony him the right of having his family with him at this time. 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- To implement such a termination would be fairly simple. The first step would be to have STEANY-1 leave the Easte area for, say, Essent for a period of three or four meeths during which time he could resume his time identity, gather his family about him, and build a new cover. At the end of this period the same efficer could recentact the agent and explain that the action, taken at the agent's own request, had created so many specify problems that it had been decided to discentians contacting the agent until he had "could been decided to discentians contacting the agent until he had "could off". A substantial sum could be given the agent to tide him over and a contact plan could be set up for a year or two homes. STERANY-1 could be recontacted at the stipulated time and passed a termination payment.
- 5. There are several security risks apparent in the above course of actions (a) STERANT-1 in registering under his true name would invedictaly expose himself to local police chacking, which could possibly reveal the subject's absence from Japan and his desertion from the Japanese emer; them by, remakening an interest in the subject, (b) STERANT-1 might willingly surrender kinesif to the Japanese authorities for the purpose of revealing his past KUBARK connection, or (c) through an overt act on the part of the agent or through (a) the subject might be brought before the Japanese authorities for questioning. In discussing this whole general problem STERANT-1 empressed the belief that in the case of (a) any police shock would be strictly local in scope, but if they did attempt to check ald army records it would be a fruitless search in that all such records consermed with the subject were destroyed in China at the end of Werld War II. Pedri (b) is indically in that we are of the epision that STERANT-1 would never willingly surrender himself to the Japanese nor would be willingly reveal his past KUBARK connections; however, we are just as cortain that if STRANT-I were to be interregated by the Japanese authorities he would divide part, if not all, of the inferention he has conservating NUMARY and its activities in Okina and Japan.
