BACKGROUND:

On 26 September 1944, an OSS team known as the Chrysler Mission, was parachuted into the zone of Mount Mottarone, Northern Italy, to work with Italian Partisans in carrying out intelligence operations behind enemy lines. American members of the mission were, Major William V. HOLOHAN, ASN 0318094, Chief of Mission; Lt. Aldo Lorenzo ICARDI, ASN 0521212, and Sgt. Carl George LO DOLCE, ASN 32687257, W/T Operator. Subsequently, the mission was joined by two Italian Partisans, Giuseppi MANNINI and Gualtiero TOZZINI.

On the night of 6 December 1944, while the Chrysler Mission was operating in the Lake Orta Region, Northern Italy, Major HOLOHAN disappeared. It was reported by the remaining members of the mission that HOLOHAN disappeared following an ambush by Nazi-Facist forces.

In the early part of 1949, evidence was uncovered which indicated that Major HOLOHAN had been murdered by one or more of the other members of the Chrysler Mission.

In June 1950, the two Italian Partisans, MANNINI and TOZZINI, confessed that the death of HOLOHAN was the result of planned murder. MANNINI stated that, he, following ICARDI's orders, placed potassium cyanide in the soup which HOLOHAN consumed on the evening of 6 December 1944, without apparent fatal effect; that the death of HOLOHAN resulted from the firing of pistol bullets into his body by ICARDI and LO DOLCE. Following the shooting, MANNINI and TOZZINI admitted that they disposed of the body in Lake Orta.

On 16 June 1950, the body of Major HOLOHAN was located and recovered from the bottom of Lake Orta. An autopsy of the corpse disclosed that Major HOLOHAN had been killed by two bullets fired into the back of his head.

On 3 August 1950, LO DOLCE, then a civilian, residing at 16 Taft Avenue, Rochester, New York, signed a statement confessing to the murder of Major HOLOHAN.

To date, ICARDI, now a civilian, has denied all implications involving him in the murder. However, it is reported that he has admitted that while on the Chrysler Mission in Italy, he feloniously embezzled by fraudulently converting to his own use, 1,650,000 Lire, gained from the sale of gold coin, the property of the United States Government.

United States Naval Reserve, from July 1931 until May 1932, and in the U.S. Army Cavalry Reserve from 14 April 1934 until called to active duty. He served with the U.S. Army in Panama from March 1942 until January 1943, on which date he was assigned to duty at Fort Riley, Kansas.

On 14 February 1944, HOLOHAN was assigned to the Office of Strategic Services, Headquarters, Washington, D. C., and on 2 May 1944 departed the U. S. for assignment with the Allied Forces Headquarters, North Africa. From 23 May 1944 until 2 July 1944, he was Assistant Operations Officer, 2677th OSS Regiment, engaged in organizing and supervising the dropping of supplies behind enemy lines. On 2 July 1944, was appointed Executive Officer, Company "A", 2677th OSS Regiment, arranging and directing missions, interrogating prisoners of war, and infiltrating agents behind enemy lines, etc.

On 26 September 1944, HOLOHAN, as Chief of OSS Chrysler Mission, parachuted behind enemy lines in Northwest Italy, with Lt. Aldo L. TCARDI and Sgt. Carl G. LO DOLCE.

On 14 December 1944, Major HOLOHAN was reported as missing in action.

HOLOHAN was promoted from First Lt. to Captain on 20 December 1942, and from Captain to Major on 27 October 1944. On 26 May 1945, while listed as missing in action, he was recommended for the award of the Bronze Star Medal for outstanding service behind enemy lines in Italy, from 26 September 1944 until 7 December 1944.

Major HOLOHAN was considered to be dependable, intelligent, resourceful officer, possessing emotional stability, sound judgment and mature discretion.

GENERAL:

During the course of the investigation concerning Major HOLOHAN's death, it was disclosed that some discord existed between HOLOHAN and ICARDI regarding the allocation of dropped material to different factions of Italian Partisans. Also, HOLOHAN, in an undated letter sent from Algiers prior to the departure of the Chrysler Mission, to an unidentified Major, attached to OSS, indicated that relations between ICARDI and himself were somewhat strained.

Subject was separated from the Army on 27 October 1945 at Washington, D. C., maintaining his rank of Captain in the Army Reserve.

ICARDI was promoted from Second Lieutenant to First Lieutenant on 27 September 1944, and to Captain on 13 September 1945. For outstanding service in Italy from 26 September 1944 until 8 May 1945, he was awarded the Legion of Merit Award and authorized to wear the Bronze Arrowhead Service Award.

In 1926 and 1936, Aldo ICARDI traveled to Italy and visited the following named relatives, Italians, who were known to be residing in that country as of 29 July 1943.

While in Peru, ICARDI and his wife associated, for the most part, with Americans with modest income, such as non-commissioned officers of the United States Military Establishment at Lima, and American employees of Pan American-Grace Air Lines. Among his close friends, in Lima, were Sgt. Fitz CHALMERS and Sgt. Floyd F. SMITH, both attached to the Office of United States Air Attache; Richard Thomas MAUCHAN, Panagra Employee, and Captain Richard HOBSON, Assistant United States Air Attache.

Subject, with his family, reportedly left Lima, Peru for the United States on 4 May 1951, intending to stop at New York City, New York, in order to confer about a position in the legal department of Panagra's Home Office, New York City. It was understood that should this position not materialize, Subject intended to establish a law practice in Pittsburgh and to reside at 287 Lelia Street, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.
