2. The Proposal

a. Objectives - to provide the necessary funds for the implementation of recommendations #4, #5, and #6 in Section VII of the approved "Plan of Operation for Bulgaria":\*

"4. Develop . . . underground networks within Bulgaria . . .

(a) Provide financial support to Robert S. Glants to emble him to develop an underground along the lines outlined in his paper Organisation of the Anti-Communist Resistance Movement in Bulgaria.

(b) Develop additional networks which will be entirely separate from Clants's organization.

\* Reconnerdations 71 and 72 of Section VII of the Flan are calted from this Project because they concern support for the Bulgarian National Committee and establishment of overt broadcasting facilities through it, and therefore fall under the project TPTCHIC. Recommendation 3 is calted because it falls within the limits of 55.

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"6. Undertake at the carliest possible date a largescale (clandestine) propaganda and psychological warfare campaign against Bulgaria . . .

"6. Undertake an economic variare compuign against Bulgaria."

b. Macussion

(1) Lines of Operation - Explanantation of the recommendations quoted above necessitizes undertaking immediately and simultaneously four lines of action. All of these lines of action should be developed concurrently. Then possible operations along two or more lines should be so integrated and timed as to permit the most effective utilization of OPC capacities and the greatest concentration of effort for the achievement of OPC ends in Bulgarie. Only in extraordinary circumstances, or as a result of conditions unforesceable at the present time should one or more lines of action be neglected in favor of any other. Particular stress, however, should be put on the IV program outlined in (b) below because it is probably the means by which we can achieve the first tangible results.

The four lines of action are as follows:

(a) <u>Support for the covert activities of Robert</u> S. Clants. Such support will involve Initially the expenditure of funds in order to test Glants and his apparatus and to determine their effectiveness and capabilities. This support may be increased if it is determined that Glants's apparatus is capable of achieving desired results.

(b) Preparation and initiation of a coordinated PV program against Hulgaria. This will necessitate the intendiate establishment of covert breadcasting facilities as near as possible to Bulgaria and similtancous proparations for the distribution of printed material within the target area. Until an independent OPC underground not becomes operative, the distribution of leaflets and other propaganda material will be accomplished through air drops, postal channels, and Glanda (spectrum)

(c) Establishment of independent OPC underground note in Bulgaria. This will necessitate the insediate recruitment and training of sgents for infiltration. Initially the number of agents will probably be scall and their activities will be confined to establishing channels of occumulcations and safe houses; making

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contacts with actual and potential Pesistance elements (other than these belonging to Glants); and possibly smuggling in limited amounts of FN material. Eventually the nets will be extended and exploited, when necessary and desirable, for operations of a more varied nature and on a larger scale, both under present conditions and in the event of open hostilities.

(d) Preparation of economic variant measures. This may initially involve on-the-spot study and recommendations in regard to the specific measures that can be undertaken effectively at the present time. The laying on of preliminary arrangements and the carrying out of small-scale economic warfare operations, shall fall within the ecope of this project. However, large-scale second o warfare operations involving significant expenditures will be ocvered by special projects.

(2) Funds - In order to provide for carrying out the operations outlined in the perseraphs above. it is estimated that a minimum of chould be allocated under this project during the remainder of Fiscal Year 1950, and that at least ( ) will be needed during Fiscal Year 1951. An initial breakdown of

these figures is given in Section 15 below.

. Recommendations - It is recommended that a total of be authorized Ismediately for project GESTAIR during FY 1950 and that budget estimate for 1951.

# 3. Operational Control

a. Readquarters Control - The entire Bulgarian operation will be under the control of CPC headquarters in Mashington. All significant operations will be subject to prior approval and authorization by Headquarters.

(1) The usual techniques will be utilized for control over psychological and economic warfare operations and over the independent OPC underground note.

(2) Control of Glants's apparatus will be of a more general nature. Glants will be informed of the general conditions with which his organisation and activities mist conform in order to continue to receive OFC support. All dealings with Glants and the members of his organization will be governed by the considerations set forth in reference e.

## b. <u>Pield Control</u>

(1) Control of OFC Field operations will be through the



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OPC Chief of Station resigned to the country in which operations take place. IC \_\_\_\_\_\_ will have field control over all GPC activities operating out of Turkey while \_\_\_\_\_\_\_ will have jurisdiction over all activities operating out of Greeco. The various activities will be coordinated by GPC headquarters. Washington.

(2) OPC will exercise field control over Glants's apparatus by penetration and careful observation.

## 4. Area of Operation

a. Geographic areas in which physical operations may take place include Nashington, D. C., Hew York City, Bulgaria, France, Turkey, Greece, Austria, Germany, Switzerland, Italy, and North Africa.

b. Possibility of overlapping jurisdiction: Since nations of Mestern Surope and the Middle East, as well as Eastern European nations, will be involved in the Bulgarian operations, more than one CPC Foreign Branch in Operations and more than a single Area Branch in Programs and Planning will be involved. This over-lapping jurisdiction shall be dealt with as follows: Administrative control will rest with the Foreign and Area Branches within Moose area an activity is carried on; Substantive and operational control will rest with the Foreign and Area Branches which have the target area within their jurisdiction.

5. Cover

a. Field Offices for this project will make use of the cover already provided for the OPC offices in the countries involved.

b. The Bulgarian National Coastitue will continue to use its established cover.

o. Appropriate cover for other operations will be developed as needed.

6. Scourlty

a. All the necessary steps will be taken to preserve the security of the operations falling within the scope of this project.

b. In addition, care will be taken in selecting contacts to work with Glants and his group and the number of such contacts will be held to a minimu.

16. Ourrant Status

(2)

a. Concerni - The OPC Plan of Operation for Bulgaria was approved by the Department of State during February 1980.

b. Personnel - The main problem in mounting operations against Bulgeria is the procurement of personnel. Considerable progress has been made in the last two months. The current situation is as follows:

(1) The Principal Agent for contact with Glants has been selected and given his initial instructions, and a secure occurring tions channel has been devised for his use;

security clearance, and his acceptibility to (

(3) is being briefed, and it is expected that he will depart on or about 28 April;

(4) Arrangements are being made to secure a technical radio specialist for supervision of both FIEMD and STAIR operations, and it is expected that he will depart for Greece on or about 1 June;

(5) The Chief of the joint FIEND-STAIR propaganda executive center in Athens is now being briefed in Mashington and will probably arrive in Athens on or about 1 Mays

(6) one agent for the GPC Mission in Greece has already departed, and two other agents, one for Greece and one for furkey, will probably arrive overseas by 1 July.

(7) Two out-outs and one consultant are currently being suployed for initial operations in the development of independent OFC underground note.

## o. In program

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(1) Flans and Operations have tentatively agreed that two mobile shortwave breadcasting transfitters will be set up as soon as possible in Greece. Each transfitter will breadcast a different propaganda line: one will breadcast nationalist-communist propaganda and the other will breadcast propaganda aimed at increasing the discontent and resistance of the masses of people.

(2) Tentative plans are being prepared for the careful the coordination of the first chortwave broadcasts and the first the first logical drop. If possible, an airdrep announcing the first france of the broadcasts will be made a few days before the first trans. Afflic dry with the stress goes on the air.

(3) The problem of using a medium wave transmitter against Bulgaria has not yet been resolved. This problem will be further carefully explored before any final decision is made.

(4) The Air Support Officer has unde initial arrangements with the Air Force for the loan of three planes: one to be used for airdrops and two for communications purposes. The Air Force would operate the two communications planes, but OPC would have to supply the crest and possibly the facilities

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for the airdrop plane. Although the arrangements with the Air Force were made with FIERD in mind, there is no apparent reason why these planes could not be used for STAIR class.

d. Economic warfare - The possibilities for undertaking communic warfare mensures in the near future are being explored by Staff III.



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
