

BRIDGES, STYLES, Republican, of Concord, New Hampshire; born in West Pembroke, Maine, September 9, 1898; was graduated from the University of Maine; received M. A. degree from Dartmouth College, and LL. D. degree from the University of Maine, University of New Hampshire, Northeastern University, Iowa Wesleyan College, Alma College, Villanova University, Portia Law School and Rider College; D. C. L. degree from Carroll College and from New England College; D. Lit. Florida Southern College; former member of the extension staff of the University of New Hampshire; former secretary and treasurer of the Farm Bureau Mutual Automobile Insurance Co.; member of the New Hampshire Public Service Commission, 1930-34; Governor of New Hampshire, 1935-37; delegate-at-large and chairman of the New Hampshire delegation to the Republican National Convention in 1936; delegate-at-large to the Republican National Convention in 1940; delegate to National Convention, 1956; at present serving as vice president and trustee of the New Hampshire Savings Bank, as director of the Rumford Press, as treasurer and trustee of the Putman Agricultural Foundation, and as director the Farm Bureau Mutual Automobile Insurance Co.; member of the National Forest Reservation Commission; married Doloris Thauwald February 11, 1944; his three sons are [redacted]

[redacted]; elected to the United States Senate on November 3, 1936; reelected for the second term on November 3, 1942; reelected for the third term on November 2, 1948; reelected for the fourth term on November 2, 1954; served as Republican leader in the second session of the Eighty-second Congress; served as President pro tempore of the United States Senate during the Eighty-third Congress; served as Chairman of the Appropriations Committee during the Eighty-third Congress; serving in the Eighty-fifth Congress as ranking Republican member of the Appropriations Committee, member of the Armed Services Committee, member of the Preparedness Investigating Subcommittee, member of the Republican Personnel Committee, chairman, Joint Congressional Committee on Inaugural Ceremonies, 1953 and 1957; member of Special Committee to Investigate Political Activities, Lobbying and Campaign Contributions, 1956-57; member of the Senate Office Building Commission, and Chairman of the Republican Policy Committee; member of the Hoover Commission; Trustee of the Robert A.
