Subject: SO Operations - European Theatre - London

1. With respect to Colonel Bruce's cable #07171 I see no objection to having Brewer and Van der Stricht come back here if this is what Dave desires.

2. Van der Stricht can be helpful in determining whether or not certain of the groups which have been recruited for work in Western Europe can be used from London - one of the stipulations of all individuals concerned being that they work under American direction.

3. With respect to Brewer (and with reference to Jimmy's comments) he would be of little or no use in any administrative job. He has no background of business experience and is frank to recognize his own limitations. He was sent to London to work under the direction of an SO Chief and has filled the job he has been holding with great reluctance as indicated by his many letters to me on the subject. He is not the most diplomatic person in the world, but will do as conscientiously as possible (and much too literally) any job which is assigned him. His place is in the field under adequate direction and not at Headquarters doing administrative work for which he has not the capacity. He could be used on operational work but will need some

training which he has forgone thus far in order to "fill the gap" as senior SO representative in London.

4. The transportation situation being what it is I favor telling London to send back only one Officer.

Dear Sir:

On May 20, there came to my office a Mr. Collins who identified himself as an investigator for the Office of Strategic Services. He proceeded to ask questions about a person whom I presume your organization is considering employing.

Mr. Collins' questions were most unfair, and I write to protest that such a man as he should be employed by the United States Government in such a capacity. He asked, for examples, if the person in question had any "liberal" tendencies. He asked if the husband of the woman in question is a member of government union. Likewise other questions were all of a kind that only a prejudiced and politically immature person would think relevant to determining whether another person were subversive or in any way disloyal.

I should have supposed that your organization would be equally interested in establishing the fact that a person whom it is considering hiring is not reactionary to the point of having Nazi or Fascist sympathies -- especially since the person in question recently came from Germany. But there was not a single question designed to establish this fact, so that I finally volunteered my opinion on this point.

The man's ignorance was amusingly instanced by his almost-whispered query, "What do you know about the American Economic Association?" He seemed not a little disappointed when I explained that the Association has no political significance and is certainly "respectable".

Mr. Collins' questions were overheard by a colleague of mine with whom I share an office, and who also was alternately shocked and amused by his questions.

Pursuant to your inquiry concerning Breed and his group, I give you the following:

The original order which we received from SO, signed by Lt. Downey, Area Operations Officer, and Stoddard Hancock, Administrative Officer, requests travel by sea. We initiated action through JCS with OPD accordingly.

On August 25th we received a revised request to have Breed shifted from sea to air. We obtained a No. 2 air priority for Breed through Navy which he can use as soon as JCS and OPD clear him for departure. Incidentally when Breed was shifted from Army transport to air, it became necessary to obtain a passport for him which required several days for issuance.

I am now discussing with Colonel Gridley the possibility of having this group of 26 men shifted to air, and Gridley shows every readiness to help, but even he cannot break down certain essential Army procedures such as the following:

The Theater Commander (Eisenhower) directed by cable that Breed was to travel by "ocean transportation". OPD follows these instructions. In addition air transportation is still so jammed that it is probable that even if air transportation for 26 men could be obtained, they would be delayed indefinitely.

My dear Admiral Horne:

We have been called upon by the Italian Commander in North Africa to supply penetration groups and operational groups largely Italian. This to have been endeavoring to do.

We have been given access to a number of Italian anti-Fascists who have been interned by the Department of Justice. From them we have been told to learn, they would be of great value to us in the Mediterranean area.

Lieutenant-Commander Edward Breda, USN, now with the Office of Naval Intelligence, by reason of his background, experience and capabilities, is peculiarly well fitted to assist us in this work both in the theater and in this country. We had hoped to obtain his release but this has not been denied. In view of the immediacy of our problem and of the great assistance that Commander Breda could render, I wonder if it is too much to ask that even if he cannot be assigned to us that he be loaned to us on a temporary basis for the next two or three months. If this were done I think it would do a great deal to the whole situation in North Africa.

Dear Admiral X:

On or about May 11th, through the usual channels, I asked for the transfer to this office of Edward Breed, Lt. Commander, USNR.

It is our desire to utilize this officer in supervising the organization, dispatch, and utilization of a number of Italian anti-Fascists who are now in Montana under the supervision of the Department of Justice, and whose violent anti-Fascism has both possibilities and probabilities of being immensely valuable in the Mediterranean Area.

The Strategic Services Officer in this theatre is being pressed by General Eisenhower's staff to accomplish within the Italian Peninsula assignments of great importance.

The utilization of this group appears to us to be most desirable and the success of their use greatly dependent upon the type and capabilities of the officer detailed to assume their direction.

Commander Breed, by reason of his background, experience, and capabilities, is one of the few officers in either the Navy or Army who appear to us ideally fitted to take this matter under his supervision.

It is hoped, therefore, that you can arrange to release this officer to us on a permanent basis, or on such temporary basis as will provide for his utilization during the development and operational stages of the group referred to above.



My dear Mr. Shaw:

Reference is made to my letter of February 9, 1943, relative to financial arrangements to be made in connection with the dispatch of Mr. Henry Brodie to our London Office as a representative of the Research and Analysis Branch. Due to the delay in Mr. Brodie's departure from the United States it is desired that certain changes be made with regard to the original plans.

Instead of \$100 per month it is desired to pay Mr. Brodie only \$50 per month of his salary through the facilities of the American Embassy in London. This arrangement should be made effective April 1, 1943, instead of March 1, 1943. Mr. Brodie will also be entitled to a living and quarters allowance in the amount of \$2,015 per annum effective upon his date of arrival in London, England.

It would be appreciated if the Department will take the necessary action to inform the Embassy officials in London relative to these changes in order that Mr. Brodie may be properly reimbursed for his salary and living and quarters allowance as set forth above.

My dear Mr. Shaw:

The Office of Strategic Services is dispatching Mr. Henry Brodie to the London office as a representative of the Research and Analysis Branch in the very near future.

Effective March 1, \$100.00 per month of Mr. Brodie's salary of \$3800.00 per annum, plus the appropriate living and quarters allowances, are to be paid to him through our London office. It is understood, of course, that the payment of living allowance will begin on date of arrival, whereas, the payment of salary indicated will begin effective March 1. All necessary deductions and adjustments for retirement, bonds, and overtime will be made by the Washington office in computing the amount of salary to be forwarded to Mr. Brodie's power of attorney in this country.

The per diem in lieu of subsistence has been authorized in the case of Mr. Brodie in the following amounts:

\$6.00 per day while traveling within the continental limits of the United States,

\$7.00 per day while traveling outside the continental limits, and

\$3.00 per day while traveling on board ship where the cost of meals is included in the cost of passage.

A copy of the travel order with respect to Mr. Brodie's transfer to London will be submitted to our London office at a later date.

It will be appreciated if the Department will make such arrangements as may be necessary with the officials of the American Embassy at London, England, with respect to payments to be made to Mr. Brodie. Vouchers covering claims for his per diem allowance and travel expenses may be honored by the officials of the American Embassy when signed by our authorized certifying officer in London. The Office of Strategic Services will reimburse the Department of State for all payments made on behalf of Mr. Brodie in accordance with existing procedure.

3. To effectively perform the above duties it is essential that Sergeant Brown have the utmost freedom of action and that he carry on his duties as a resident of the particular country in which he is to be stationed. This freedom of action and effectiveness of operation can only be achieved by his being in civilian status. Authorization to wear civilian clothes in the performance of the above assignment would be inadequate for his military status would be disclosed by his identification papers and travel orders.

4. Sergeant Brown's education and training ideally qualify him for his proposed assignment. He is 31 years of age, having been born on 29 April 1914 at Ilion, New York. He holds the following degrees: AB, Hamilton College, New York; Doctorate de l'Universite from the University of Paris; and Ph.D., Catholic University. As an instructor and language specialist he is unusually qualified for the study of cultural and psychological conditions in the area to which he will be assigned. He speaks fluent French, Spanish, and Portuguese; he has translated a book from the Portuguese. He has a wide acquaintance among Catholic and diplomatic circles in both Spain and Portugal. Before entering the Army, Sergeant Brown served as Assistant Chief, Foreign Language Section, Overseas Branch, of OWI. At

I just got back from a trip to ETO and read your interesting suggestion of 24 May for a "combat aide" with field experience and an understanding of the problems of the men in the theaters who are doing a job on the spot.

As you know, I try to visit as many of our groups in the field as possible. Colonel Bigelow investigated the question of jump pay yesterday afternoon and the facts are as follows:

You promise came to the Med at the dinner was kept and the Med were given jump pay while in the United States in accordance with your instructions although the form of their orders did not technically entitle them to this compensation.

Med says that when the Jedburghs (SO) were sent to China they were informed that jump pay would depend upon the facts in the theater. If they were given a tier requiring jumping they would receive jump pay. If theater duty did not require parachute work they would not receive this pay.

Not feel there could not have been any reasonable misunderstanding of these facts because everyone was very much awake to the issue here and the matter was subject of great discussion by everyone. Therefore, our officers in Washington were especially anxious there should be no further misunderstanding.

Brown has an SO team being the lines. I do not believe they have done anything because a recent cable stated that the first Chinese who have jumped were a group of Chinese commandos and not an SO team. I do not see how anything can be done, therefore, except to repeat this statement in a note to Brown.

If you wish Colonel Bigelow to write him to that effect Med will, I am sure, be glad to take care of it.

Dear General Donovan,

By the time you receive this, I will have been in the field for a considerable period, as leader of an SO operation (team name LION). I had hoped to be present when you arrived here, but of course my mission comes first, and I am only too glad of the opportunity to get to work again. The interval between the Tadjbigh mission in France and this one has seemed pretty long. As I have a team of two other officers, one radio man, one field photo man, one interpreter, 50 Chinese, plus an MO unit of seven men, under my command, I should be able to turn in a good job, and we certainly have the makings of a real organization behind the lines.

I have written Col. Buxton several times, but have not received any reply. This is not unusual, as the mail is so uncertain here, but I would appreciate it a great deal if, upon your return to Washington, you would give him my best.

I think he has mentioned to you the idea I have had for a long time about a combat aide for you. You may recall that, upon the return of our group

from Europe; and when you were host at the first banquet for us in Washington, I mentioned to Col. Burton the matter of our losing jump pay. At the end of your speech after dinner, you assured us we would continue to draw the pay. I feel strongly that I should bring to your attention many matters of this kind, which I, as a field man with experience in both theaters, would notice, but which the ordinary staff man in Washington would not. If you knew how very well received and appreciated was your speech to us, then I think you would agree with me. There are many points which I would like to present to you even now.

I hope you will not consider the above forward on my part. I write this only because I feel so very strongly that the field personnel, as opposed to the staff and planning personnel, should be represented in the higher echelons, close to you.

Would you be kind enough to give my uncle, Arthur Krock, my very best upon your return.

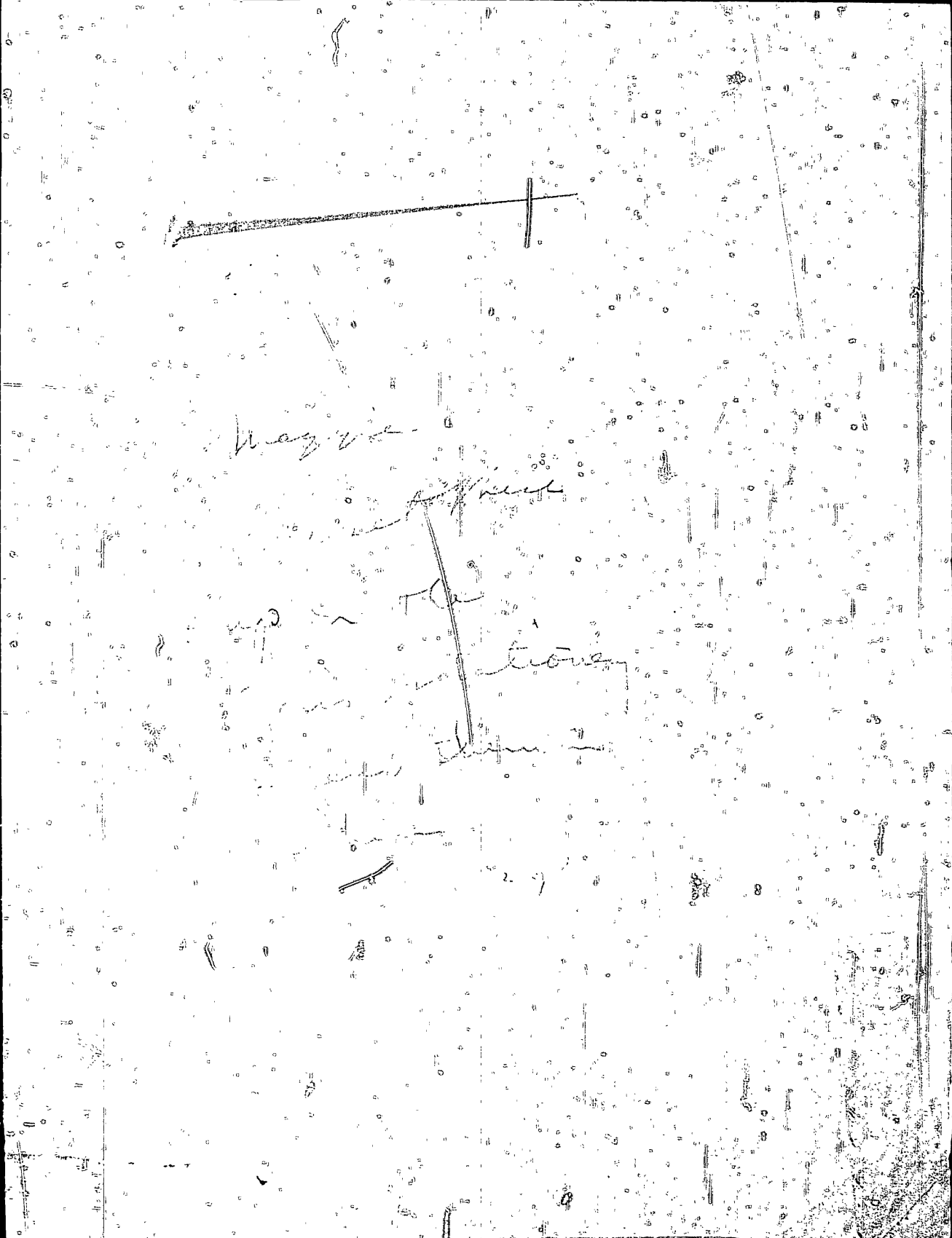

1. Brunetti and Pardo are employees of OES under contracts dated 3 November 1944. The compensation thereunder is, in each case, \$2,000.00. The term of the subject contracts is for 90 days plus travelling time from Rome, Italy to the United States and return.

SUPPLEMENTAL AGREEMENT

WHEREAS the SUPPLEMENTAL AGREEMENT made this day of February, 1945, between the Government of the United States as represented by the Office of Strategic Services (hereinafter called "the Employer"), and COLONEL MARIO BRUNETTI, (hereinafter called "the Employee").

AND WHEREAS, the parties have entered into a contract dated 8 November 1944 (hereinafter called "said agreement") which requires the Employee to perform certain duties as therein specified; and

AND WHEREAS, the said parties desire the Employee to continue to perform such of said duties for a further period;

THE PARTIES HERETO AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

1. Paragraph 1 of said agreement is hereby amended by deleting "ninety (90)" and inserting "one hundred ten (110)".

2. Paragraph 4 of said agreement is hereby amended by deleting "two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) as compensation for the duration of this contract, one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00)" and inserting in place thereof "two thousand four hundred fifty dollars (\$2,450.00) as compensation for the duration of this contract, one thousand four hundred fifty dollars (\$1,450.00)".

3. Except as amended hereby, the provisions of said agreement shall remain in full force and effect without change.
