Justification

Production. - Funds requested for 1951-52 are based on the proposed program calling for completion of 8 reports on areas of average difficulty. Costs are based on the experience gained to date on 20 areas, details of which are given in the attached tabulation. Because so few of the reports have reached completion it is necessary to estimate ultimate costs on the basis of expenditures to date, and the status of each area study on May 1, 1950 in terms of percentage completed. The costs shown cover only the work done on Solid Fuels, Metals, and Minerals. The costs of the sections on Petroleum and Natural Gas have averaged 32 percent of those of the other minerals.

The estimated average cost of completed reports on the 20 areas now under study is \$6,100 per country. However, this group includes several areas where unit costs were exceedingly small owing to the fact that the mineral economy is of little significance, such as Okinawa, Egypt, Greenland, Iceland, and Iraq. Consequently the average cost of the 20 areas does not present a fair basis for determining expenditures required to complete reports on countries of average complexity. It is believed that the costs on Sweden, Yugoslavia, Portugal, and the United Kingdom - countries with moderate or substantial industry - present a more accurate appraisal of costs for areas of average difficulty. These averaged \$8,500, and this figure is used as a basis of estimating 1951-52.

Some reduction in operating costs may be expected as a result of experience gained to date, but the research conducted so far has demonstrated serious deficiencies in available information on certain points particularly pertinent to NIS uses. It is believed that any savings gained from experience will be offset by the added cost of research needed to provide reports that more closely meet NIS standards.

Maintenance. - As of July 1, 1951 preliminary drafts of reports on 24 countries will have been completed. Thus for the fiscal year 1952 the maintenance program will include 24 areas. Because many of the countries included in the group of 24 to be kept under surveillance published very inadequate data on their mineral economy or have discontinued publication of any data, the research required to support reliable appraisal of developments in these areas is exceedingly high. For example, minimum maintenance costs for Russia will exceed \$10,000 per annum. On the other hand maintenance costs on several areas will be relatively small. Average maintenance costs for NIS objectives only are estimated at \$1,000 per country per year, and this figure is believed to be conservative if anything more than a casual appraisal of developments is desired.

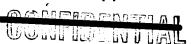

### Justification

### Production

Experience, to date, based largely on the 1950 fiscal year indicates the total number of man-hours required at the working level for each basic report, exclusive of maintenance and revision, is about 1,560 hours; and at the supervisory level about 90 hours. Including expenses for equipment, travel, supplies, communications, etc., total cost for preparation of 8 basic reports in 1952 will be about \$32,000, or \$4,000 per area (Enclosure I). Deadline dates for submitting the reports completed in fiscal year 1949 were spaced too closely to permit sufficient time for adequate checking of sources and for ferreting out difficult material. The full complement of personnel necessary to carry out properly all assigned projects was not obtained until fiscal year 1950. Considerable overtime work in meeting deadline dates was, therefore, required of the 1949 staff. Also, note that supervisory time as well as the overtime of the working level personnel was not charged against the project.

The only increased costs for production of basic reports in fiscal year 1952 are for pay increases provided by law. The small budget allowed for the fisheries work does not permit absorption of these salary increases.

#### Maintenance

The 15% maintenance allowance in the budget for 1951 fiscal year will be used to employ a graphics analyst for the purpose of preparing graphics which, in fiscal 1949 and 1950, were prepared in first drafts by the investigators themselves. The new employee will take the burden of this work away from the investigators, so that they are free to do maintenance and revision work. Whether or not revisions as such are required in fiscal year 1951, the investigators will need to keep abreast of developments in the areas completed. This graphics analyst will be retained in fiscal year 1952.
