

GENERAL INFORMATION

REGISTRATION

The Registration Desk and Information Center will be located on the first mezzanine of the headquarters hotel, the Sheraton-McAlpin, and will be open from 2:00 to 10:00 p.m. on Monday, March 31; 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. on Tuesday, April 1; and 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Wednesday and Thursday, April 2 and 3. Members who have registered in advance by mail are asked to check in at the Registration Desk to pick up their badges. Others may register by filling out a registration card, available at the Registration Desk, and giving the card and registration fee to one of the registration clerks who will make out a badge. Members are urged to check periodically during the meeting at the Information Center for messages left by colleagues and friends trying to contact them.

TRANSPORTATION

The Sheraton-McAlpin Hotel is at Broadway and Sixth Avenue between 33rd and 34th Streets. The Hotel is centrally located and can be reached inexpensively by taxi from all the major airline, bus, and railroad terminals in Manhattan. Pennsylvania Station is within easy walking distance; the Hetel is one block east from the Station on 33rd Street. Travelers arriving at Grand Central Station may take the subway shuttle crosstown to Times Square, change there to the Downtown IRT Seventh Avenue subway, get off at the next stop (33rd Sreet-Pennsylvania Station), exit to the street, and walk east one block on 33rd Street. The New York Port Authority Bus Terminal is at Eighth Avenue between 40th and 41st Street and is about a ten-minute walk from the hotel down Eighth Avenue and east two blocks on 34th Street. Those coming by air into La Guardia or Idlewild Airports should take the airport bus (fare \$1.35) to the East Side Airlines Terminal at First Avenue between 37th and 38th Streets; there is a crosstown bus at 34th Street, three blocks south of the Terminal, which goes past the Sheraton-McAlpin. Persons arriving at the Newark Airport should take the airport bus (fare also \$1.35) to the West Side Airlines Terminal at Tenth Avenue between 41st and 42nd Streets; walk or take a bus to 34th Street and then the crosstown bus to the hotel. Subway and bus fares in New York City are 15 cents.

To get to Columbia from the Sheraton-McAlpin, walk west on 33rd Street one block to the IRT Seventh Avenue subway and take the Van Cortland Park express train uptown to 116th Street. To reach New York University, go across the street from the Hotel to Gimbel's and take the IND Sixth Avenue "D" train downtown to West Fourth Street. For directions to other points of interest in New York, consult the Information Center on the first mezzanine in the Hotel.

RESTAURANTS

New York City has numerous restaurants of all shapes, sizes, and descriptions. Here are a few in the midtown area of possible interest to members of the Association. Japanese: Miyako, 20 West 56th Street (between Fifth and Sixth Avenues); Saito, 70 West 55th Street (between Sixth and Seventh Avenues; expensive but attractive); Suehiro, 35 East 29th Street (between Madison and Fourth Avenues). Chinese: Ho-Ho, 789 Seventh Avenue (at 52nd Street; expensive but good); Lum's Garden, 111 West 49th Street (between Sixth and Seventh Avenues); Sun Luck, 143 West 49th Street (between Sixth and Seventh Avenues; expensive but good). Philippine: The Philippine Garden Restaurant, 455 Second Avenue (near 26th Street). Middle Eastern and North Indian: the Golden Horn, 122 West 49th Street (between Sixth and Seventh Avenues).
