Saturday - 9 January 1965

(Unclassified - GLC) In view of the inquiries we have received from the staff of the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy attempting to establish a date for the Director's briefing, I advised George Murphy, of the Committee staff, that arrangements were made this morning for the Agency to brief the Senate Armed Services Committee and the Defense Subcommittee of Senate Appropriations jointly on Monday morning. I added that this was a "posture" briefing. Murphy asked if it would be possible for him to sit in on this briefing. I told him that we would take this up with the Director if he wished but pointed out that Senator Pastore (who remains as Chairman of the JCAE until its first meeting of this Congress) would probably be present since he is a member of the Defense Subcommittee. Murphy declined not to have the question raised but thanked us for contacting him. ✓

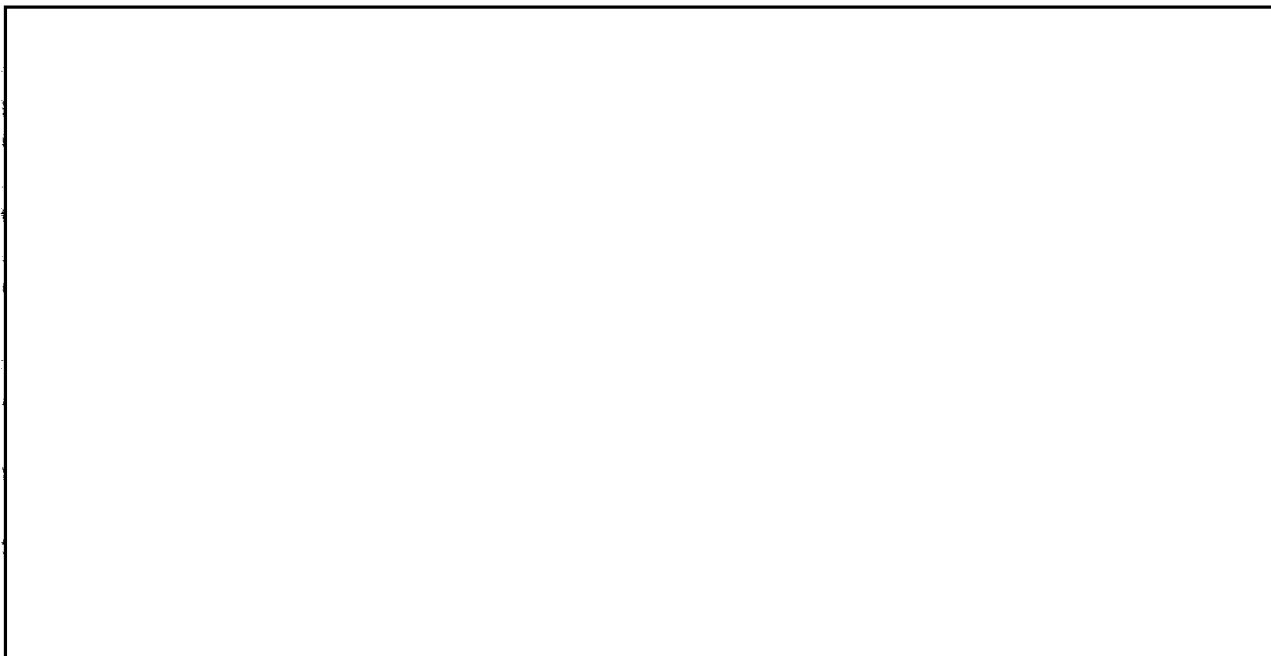

(Internal Use Only - J3W) Worked with Mr. Darden making definite arrangements for the Director's appearance before the full Senate Armed Services Committee and Defense Subcommittee of Senate Appropriations. The time was set for 10:30 on 11 January 1965. Mr. Darden indicated that Senator Russell specifically requested that a transcript be made. In view of the high classification of the content, Mr. Darden was in full accord that we should take special precautions with the reporting firm. Darden indicated that the hearing would be listed as a posture briefing. ✓

11. (Unclassified -) Stopped by to chat with Mr. Richard Coalin, Press Secretary to Senator Walter F. Mondale. Mr. Coalin is a personal friend. I mentioned to him that once things settle down for the Senator, senior officials of the Agency would welcome the opportunity to "break bread" with the Senator at the Agency. At this juncture, the Senator walked into the room, and in the process of introduction, Mr. Coalin told him that we were interested in having him come out. Senator Mondale indicated that he would be delighted. As he was leaving for a meeting at that moment, no date was set; but we will follow this up first thing next week.
