- TRANSPORTATION. Air Lines. The nearest airport to Williamsburg is Patrick Henry Field (Williamsburg and Newport News). This airport is served by Capital and by Piedmont Air Lines. Limousine service to the Williamsburg Lodge. The Byrd Airport of Richmond is served by American, Capital, Eastern, National, and Piedmont Air Lines. Limousine service to Richmond. However, the Byrd Airport is on the road to Williamsburg and a Greyhound bus connection may be made with some plane arrivals by calling the Richmond Bus Terminal to request that the bus stop at the entrance to the airport on Highway U. S. 60. Bus stop can be reached by cab from the airport. Railroad. Williamsburg is on the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway. Pullman and coach service from Chicago and St. Louis, via Cincinnati. Connections in Richmond with the Atlantic Coast Line and the Seaboard from the south and with the Richmond, Fredericksburg & Potomac Railroad from Washington. Bus. Greyhound from Richmond, where north, south, and west connections Private Cars. Williamsburg is on U. S. 60 (Richmond to Newport News) can be made.

Private Cars. Williamsburg is on U. S. 60 (Richmond to Newport News) and on U. S. 168 (from Newport News) which, 12 miles northwest of Williamsburg, affords the quickest route to Washington via VA. 33 to West Point, thence by VA. 30 to U. S. 360 north.
