Post Writer Picked for Polk Award

Dan Kurzman, staff writer on Latin American affairs for The Washington Post, and Bernard B. Fall, professor of international relations at Howard University were among nine George Polk Memorial Award winners announced yesterday.



The awards were given by Long Island University for **Kurzman** "outstanding journalistic achievements during 1965."

Kurzman, who has been with The Washington Post since 1962, was cited in the foreign reporting category for "resourcefulness, insight and courage in covering the revolt in the Dominican Republic."

Fall was honored in the interpretive reports category "for his in-depth published commentaries on the Vietnamese War." Author of several books, he has contributed a number of articles and book reviews published in The Washington Post.

Also honored is David Levine, for his unique caricatures of public figures, which are appearing in the New York Review of Books and The Washington Post.

Other award winners are: John B. Oakes, editorial page editor of the New York Times; Barry Gottehrer, formerly of the New York Herald Tribune and now on the staff of New York Major John V. Lindsay; James A. Bourdier, Associated Press photographer; Susan Sontag, Partisan Review contributor; Beryl Fox, producer for the Canadian Broadcasting Corp., and Morley Safer, CBS News correspondent.
