**'Subversion' Inquiry at Rutgers
Asked by Jersey Labor Leader**

NEWARK, June 6 — The president of the state A.F.L.-C.I.O., in a reference to the Genovese case, called today for a Congressional investigation of Rutgers to see whether the state university was carrying on an active program of subversion.

Vincent J. Murphy, the long-time head of the state labor movement, attacked the university and its leadership in his annual report to the fifth convention of the state American Federation of Labor and Congress of Industrial Organizations.

Citing the case of Assistant Prof. Eugene Genovese, who has publicly supported the Communist cause in Vietnam, Mr. Murphy told the 1,500 delegates meeting at the Robert Treat Hotel here:

"As long as Genovese and his ilk continue in the employment of Rutgers, our state university will be degraded by their presence throughout the country."

The state labor leader denounced the president of the university, Dr. Mason Gross, charging that he had "definitely shown a total lack of leadership."

"We are not lawyers, and do

not know the legal definition of treason or traitors," Mr. Murphy continued, "but we can publicly denounce those in our midst who call for our defeat. I call upon all members of Congress from New Jersey to institute an investigation of the conditions at Rutgers in order to determine whether or not there is an active program of subversion going on at the university."
