Some time and the Grafts malan newspaper La Hora published a report about the acquisition and operation of a military training base by the United States Central Intelligence Agency in the area around Retabuleu, near Guatemala City. The story indicated the purpose of the base was to train troops for a projected invasion of Cuha.

Some time later, the Guate-malan dictator, Miguel Ydigor-as Fuente, admitted the existence of the base but refused to say anything more about it and clamped strict censorship on the Guatemalan newspapers masofar as this matter was concerned.

On Nov. 11, the Nation printed a story to the same effect and quoted as its source, the director of the Institute of Hispanic - American Studies, at Stanford University in Palo Alto, Dr. Ronald Hilton.
