William Schaub With Top 10 Career Workers In Federal Government

William Fulton Schaub, Chief of the Military Division of the U.S. Bureau of the Budget and a native of Sandusky, has been selected by the National Civil Service League as one of the top 10 career workers in the federal government for 1960.

The award will be presented to Schaub at a colorful dinner in Washington, D.C., on March 15. Dinner is open to the public.

The League, a non-partisan citizen organization founded in 1881, annually presents an award to 10 federal employes chosen because of competence, character and achievement as representing the highest standards of a career service.

Schaub's government service dates from 1933 when he became an employe of the Federal Works Agency. He transferred to the Bureau of the Budget in 1941, as a budget examiner and through successive promotions rose to his present position in 1952, where he serves as the director's and the President's foremost career staff adviser in the executive office on budgeting for and management of military programs.

It is his job to see that the money spent on defense is spent effectively and efficiently.

Woman Among 10

Nine men and one woman were named as the outstanding Federal government workers. Seven of the 10 work in the Washington, D.C. area, one in Paris, France, one in Virginia and one in North Carolina. They come from a broad range of government activities. Three are scientists, one a general administrator, one a field administrator, two are engaged in financial management, one in intelligence, one in economics and one in foreign affairs.
