WASHINGTON'S WOMAN HUNT: President Johnson is losing women from top Government jobs almost as fast as he can replace them. Despite the hue and cry last year about finding 50 women to hold high-level Federal posts, only three have been appointed in 1965. They are Penelope Hartland Thunberg, named with great fanfare last week to fill a vacancy on the U. S. Tariff Commission, Aileen Hernandez, on the Equal Opportunity Commission, and Patricia Roberts Harris, new Ambassador to Luxembourg. But in the first two weeks of July, two women left important Government posts -- Dr. Mary I. Bunting from the Atomic Energy Commission and Dr. Leona Baumgartner from the Agency for International Development. Note: Among the women being considered as next U.S. Treasurer is Marjorie McKensie Lawson, associate judge of the Washington, D. C., juvenile court and a JFK appointee. Judge Lawson is a Negro.
