Dr. V. is proud anti - Semitism has abated

THE PRIME MINISTER, Dr. Verwoerd, has told Mr. Saul E' Jofes, director of the office of international affairs of the Bnei Brith, that he is proud that anti-Semitism in South Africa has abated since the Nationalist Government came to power in 1948.

Mr. Jofes paid a courtesy call on Dr. Verwoerd in Cape Town this week.

Dr. Verwoerd told Mr. Jofes that Jews of South Africa had contributed a lot to the country, and would continue to do so.

The Bnei Brith is an international Jewish lodge and welfare organisation with headquarters in America.

Mr. Jofes is in South Africa to establish new Bnei Brith lodges.

"The Bnei Brith concerns itself not only with Jewish charitable work, but also with the safeguarding of human rights, no matter where they may be violated," Mr. Jofes said. "The Bnei Brith helped to alleviate the plight of Jews behind the Iron Curtain."
