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Nabbed In Annapolis
**CIA Agent Fined \$104
In 2 Driving Violations**

ANNAPOLIS, Aug. 11—A member of the government's Central Intelligence Agency, who said he was "on a CIA mission to Annapolis," wound up the mission by paying a fine of \$104 after being found guilty of drunken and reckless driving here.

The agent, Herbert G. Schoonmaker, 43, of Fairfax, Va., was arrested in the early morning hours of July 28 by Annapolis police officer Earl R. Creech.

In People's Court here yesterday before Judge Bruce C. Williams, the officer testified that he arrested the CIA agent after he noticed him drive from a parking lot with his lights out, narrowly missing a huge construction ditch near the road.

OFFICER CREECH said that the erratic driver then nearly hit a police car being driven in the opposite direction by city police officer William H. Disney.

Both officers testified that they chased Schoonmaker down West St. and described the fleeing car "as barely missing" a series of parked vehicles.

Officer Creech testified that Schoonmaker at first refused to

tell them where he was employed, but finally conceded that he was an employe of the CIA.

Schoonmaker told the judge that he revealed his place of employment only after the arresting officer "had agreed to keep it between us."

HE THEN testified that when he saw his employment status on the summons, "I knew then that it was no longer between the two of us."

He added that CIA people are supposed to answer, when asked about employment, that they work for the U.S. government.

He said when he finished his "mission" he went into a restaurant in Annapolis where he had several drinks.

In finding him guilty, Judge Williams remarked that "all of the testimony offered here indicates that you are guilty as charged."
