## ROA OF CUBA FLIES TO TALK WITH DIAZ

Castro's Foreign Chief Sees  
Mexican President 2 Hours

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 11—

Foreign Minister Raúl Roa of Cuba flew here today for an apparently cordial two-hour meeting with President Gustavo Díaz Ordaz to discuss issues that have strained Cuban-Mexican relations recently.

Mexico is the only Latin American country that maintains diplomatic relations with Cuba and this city serves as a major point for air transport and communications with Havana.

The meeting was at Mr. Roa's request and he returned to Havana immediately after the interview.

### Farewell Is Cordial

"Next time you come, don't be in such a rush," Mr. Díaz Ordaz was heard to say to Mr. Roa as the two men came out of the President's office. They embraced in Latin American fashion as they said good-bye.

Mexican officials have not concealed their annoyance over a Cuban note last week that "be in such a rush," Mr. Díaz, the Mexican Embassy in Havana, Humberto Carrillo Colon, of being an agent of the United States Central Intelligence Agency.

Mexico's Foreign Minister, Antonio Carrillo Flores, recalled Mr. Carrillo Colon, who returned here Monday, and ordered an investigation.

### Mexico Rejects Protest

Mexico rejected the Cuban note as unacceptable, since it accused the press attaché of diplomatic mails to be used to transmit alleged intelligence from the embassy in Havana to the United States agency.

The rejection of the Cuban note followed by 12 days a Mexican note of protest over Cuba's refusal to consider a Mexican request for extradition of two Mexican students who hijacked a Mexican airliner and forced it to fly to Havana on July 26.

The students were granted political asylum by Cuba after asserting that they were being hunted by the Mexican police for their part in organizing demonstrations here last year.
