**Pearson Lawyers to Question****Dodd Subpenaed  
With His Records**

Lawyers for columnists Drew Pearson and Jack Anderson yesterday subpoenaed Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, (D., Conn.) to appear in their office Monday morning to give a sworn deposition and bring certain documents and records.

Sen. Dodd filed a \$5 million libel suit against them April 1, claiming they had conspired since 1958 to "injure and destroy" his political career.

The subpoena, filed yesterday by Mr. Pearson's lawyer, John Donovan, and Mr. Anderson's lawyer, Warren Woods, lists 49 sets of records the Senator is to bring with him, including:

- Copies of his income tax returns from 1956-1965.
- Records of donations and expenditures for his campaigns.
- Receipts and canceled checks of payments he made for the October, 1964, wedding of his daughter, Martha.
- Records of contributions from various companies including the National Broadcasting Co., Radio Corporation of America, and Pan American and World Airways.
- Correspondence with Ed Sullivan about a testimonial dinner and a letter dated Nov. 2, 1961, from Mr. Sullivan enclosing a check for \$35,000 from proceeds of the dinner.
- All correspondence between

Sen. Dodd and former National Guard Gen. Julius Klein, director of a Chicago public relations firm that handles West German interests.

**ENDORSEMENTS**

The subpoena specifically refers to a letter in which Sen. Dodd indorsed Gen. Klein for membership in the American Battle Monuments Commission — a post he never got — and another letter regarding a possible appointment for Gen. Klein to the U.S. Advisory Commission on Information.

Other letters requested involved Gen. Klein's indorsement of Sen. Dodd in a letter to Jewish voters in Connecticut and Gen. Klein's arrangement of a Mercedes auto for Sen. Dodd on a trip he made to Europe.

**MUTUAL**

Both columnists have accused Sen. Dodd of doing favors for Gen. Klein and getting favors in return.

Also requested was correspondence between the Senator and United Aircraft and Kaman Aircraft, relating to alleged favors the two companies did for him, and any "services, favors, or representation" he made for them "with any branch of the government," plus correspondence with insurance companies regarding the Senator's "activities" in their behalf.
