

No Change Reported In Dulles' Condition

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State Department officials said this afternoon that there was no significant change today in the condition of John Foster Dulles.

Mr. Dulles, who has been fighting cancer since 1958, has been suffering from pneumonia for the last eight days.

The former Secretary of State's wife, Janet, has been spending nights at the hospital while other members of the family, called to Washington, have been making daily visits.

Mr. Dulles' cancer was discovered in 1956 when a malignant tumor was removed from the colon. He made a good recovery from this operation and quickly resumed his normal work and travel.

But last February, when Mr. Dulles was operated on for

hernia, physicians ascertained that his abdominal cancer had recurred. He returned early last month to Walter Reed Army Hospital, where examination on April 12 indicated that the malignancy had spread to his lower neck.

The other members of Mr. Dulles' family gathered here are his brother, Allen W. Dulles, director of the Central Intelligence Agency; his sister, Eleanor, State Department official in charge of Berlin affairs; his son Avery, a Jesuit priest who had been studying in Rome, and another son, John Watson Dulles, a mining engineer who has been working in Mexico.

Also, two sisters, Mrs. Margaret Edward of Rye, N. Y., and Mrs. Natalie Seymour of Utica, N. Y.; and a daughter, Mrs. Robert Hinshaw of New York City.
