"It is vitally important," Rep. Ashbrook continued, "that Col. Government may be speaking in good faith with what they actually have, or haven't learned, from the Polish-born defector. It has consistently lied about such Communist penetration as those made in Warsaw. a classic in the balance of Washington, and elsewhere."

They wanted fill-ins on one of the touchiest aspects of this unique case—the conflict of versions of the defector's story as relayed by spokesmen of the Executive and Legislative branches of the Government.
