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## Hartke Charges CIA Used Students in 1965

Sen. Vance Hartke says the CIA pressed National Student Association leaders into service as undercover agents during the 1965 revolution in the Dominican Republic.

The Indiana Democrat charged in a Senate speech yesterday that the secret agency sent the NSA leaders to Santo Domingo both before and during the fighting to compile dossiers on Dominican student activists.

Hartke said NSA leaders told him that "ostensibly, they were to talk with student leaders in the country about university modernization."

But he said that in fact, they were sent to Santo Domingo to dispatch reports to the Plans Division of the CIA. Hartke

said the student reports were used by the agency to make a political evaluation of the revolution.

Hartke said the CIA threatened NSA leaders to keep them quiet about their role, United Press International reported.

In Miami Beach, meanwhile, AFL-CIO President George Meany said he will investigate reports that the labor movement has been heavily subsidized by the CIA.

Meany said he had no personal knowledge of any CIA money going to any labor unions, and he flatly denied any went to the AFL-CIO itself, the Associated Press reported.

He also denied that Jay Lovestone, AFL-CIO international affairs director, was involved in any way with the CIA.
