Mys 'Errors' in Film 'Operation Abolition' Don't Affect Purpose

While your paper deserves a pat on the back for such columns at Lyle C. Wilson's on April 6 regarding the necessity of reducing our outrageous national debt, I fail to see what useful purpose you purport to serve when you print such trash as the critical comments on General Walker by Jim G. Lucas the same day.
