Jagan's Book Tells How CIA Subverted Guyana

DR. CHEDDI JAGAN, former Prime Minister of British Guiana, now named Guayana, gives a detailed account of the Central Intelligence Agency's role in toppling his government in a book he has written, "The West on Trial: My Fight for Guyana's Freedom."

The book is being published next month by International Publishers, who point out that Jagan "is in a unique position to explain the political events of his country and to describe the pressure from the United States and England to keep Guyana in their 'orbit' and prevent 'another Cuba.'"

James S. Allen, head of Inter-

national, informed us that Jagan's revelations of CIA intrigue "are stronger than anything yet disclosed."

Allen was referring to the recently exposed involvement of the CIA and the State, County and Municipal Workers union in formenting general strikes against Jagan's government.

Although Jagan was deposed in 1964, he still heads the largest political party in Guyana.

The book, illustrated with 23 photographs, tells of Jagan's life as the son of indentured workers imported from India to work on a sugar plantation, and of the struggles of Guyana's people for independence.
