Washington, March 18 Senate investigators learned today that five high-ranking employes of the office of security, state department, have been transexplosive."

The five employes in the special review branch which specializes in the evaluation of security risks were informed that their new assignment was "top secret" and admonished not to reveal it to anyone.

"This has been directed from. top-side, including express arections from the White House." they were told.

The reassignment was effective last Monday. The "special project" was reported to involve an inquiry into the communist connections of aliens who associate with state department employes.
