## Counsels Caution

To the Editor of The Times:

In reply to Mrs. Biliman's letter concerning Senator Goldwater in the Feb. 13 Hartford Times, let me say that the late President Kennedy most assuredly did not let communism into power in Cuba.

Where he errs is in assuming that his distinctive conservative anarchism represents a responsible preference. The Senator's rollicking guise of diplomacy is clear enough to be sure. Clearly irresponsible. Damning the poverty stricken, consuring the United Nations. or threatening to export Marines to Cuba make the Senator more of a security risk than the Soviet KGB at a CIA parley. The global array of madcap confusion strikes a mood of depression and pessimism in many Americans and perhaps Senator Gold-water has support firmly rooted in diplomatic frustra-

But Mr. Goldwater is not likely to be our star of hope. The question of choice is whether the United States citizenry prefers to sustain the existing approach to foreign policy or to embrace as the alternative a hysterical prince in a fool's paradise. The impetuous Senator from Arizona may present a discernible choice but in terms of his political perspective his visibility is zero.
