Its summary said Sloboda was born in Podkamien in the Ukraine and during World War II was sent to Germany as a forced laborer.

After the war, he spent time in a displaced persons camp in Germany, emigrated to England, and then returned to Germany where he enlisted in the U.S. Army in 1953.

After basic training in the United States, Sloboda was assigned in August 1958 to an Army military intelligence group in Europe. Two years later he defected.

The Army summary said Dutkanicz was a native of Garlice Enrine in Polund, entered the United States December 1946 and was inducted into the Army in February 1951.
