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DIARY NOTES

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16 October 1958

1. Jim Garrison called to correct an impression given me by the Logistics Officer at [REDACTED] to the effect that we are going to store [REDACTED] there in addition to that at [REDACTED]. He assures me that there are no such plans and that supplies will be limited to those necessary to meet their needs.

2. I agreed with Ed Saunders that [REDACTED] would replace [REDACTED] on the Headquarters Board of Survey effective 1 January 1959.

3. [REDACTED] and Messrs. [REDACTED] were in to review the Audit Report of Project MKULTRA. We concluded that the Technical Services Staff was administering this Project properly and that no further action on my part was necessary.

4. George Carey telephoned to complain about a [REDACTED] who, upon being examined [REDACTED] had stated that he was going to [REDACTED]. George believes that [REDACTED] is an employee of our [REDACTED]. I told him that I would run this down and call him back.

5. I met briefly with Messrs. Saunders and [REDACTED] to discuss the briefing which the President's Board of Consultants on Foreign Intelligence has requested on 20 November 1958. I asked [REDACTED] to get together with the DD/P representative and to consult me again as soon as an outline of the briefing was prepared.

6. With Mr. Dulles, General Cabell and others I lunched with Lyle Fisher, former General Counsel in the Office of the Comptroller General, who is now retired and working for the Martin Company in Baltimore. Mr. Fisher is most anxious to be of any assistance he can.

7. I discussed with General Cabell the request made by [REDACTED] to have a luncheon for the wives of senior people in the Office of Central Reference, using the Office of National Estimates' luncheon as a precedent. After some discussion General Cabell agreed with me that it would be best not to have such luncheons in the future. I have notified [REDACTED] and Shef Edwards.

9. [REDACTED] reported that the Bureau of the Budget had requested a briefing on certain aspects of Project [REDACTED]. Apparently this comes about by reason of the fact that

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the Project has terminated certain foreign nationals causing the Department of State to take certain actions involving the expenditure of money. I don't quite understand all of this but, in any case, [redacted] is going to brief the Bureau. He also reported that Mr. Scott Moore of the Bureau of the Budget had agreed that at least for the time being he did not need to be briefed by the Agency on the I&NS problem in which Herman [redacted] and the Director have been involved.

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10. Jim Cunningham was in with a request to recruit [redacted] an ex-employee, to replace [redacted] as Executive Officer at [redacted]. I told him that I was opposed to this unless we were unable to supply someone from those people already on board and asked him to discuss the matter with [redacted].

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11. [redacted] advised me that he liked his new position very much and would be perfectly willing to stay on in this capacity with the idea of becoming a Support "generalist" rather than return to the Office of Communications and go to [redacted] sometime next year. I told him that I would like to discuss the matter with [redacted] and that between us we would try to decide what was best for his own career development.

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12. Ed Saunders reported some difficulty in collecting an advance from [redacted] the advance having been made to Mr. [redacted] when he and [redacted] accompanied the Bureau of the Budget representatives on a trip to the Far East. Ed has pretty clear evidence that in the course of their discussions Mr. [redacted] made some false official statements. Since Ed will be leaving for Latin America on Monday, and in order to avoid bringing Bob into this, I agreed that [redacted] could bring the whole file to me as soon as it was in order.

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
