1. (Unclassified - RJK) LIAISON I stopped in the office of Representative G. V. Montgomery (D., Miss.) and picked up a copy of his press release of 8 December relating to his efforts in behalf of U. S. MIA's.

2. (Unclassified - RJK) BRIEFING Jim Dolan, on the staff of Representative Margaret Heckler (R., Mass.), called and said that the Congresswoman will be heading a delegation of women Members of Congress to the People's Republic of China later this month. She has asked the Agency for a map of the People's Republic of China and a briefing on the current situation there. She has also requested a briefing on Angola. I told Dolan I would look into the matter and be back in touch with him. After checking, I discovered that [redacted] was already coordinating with [redacted] OCI, on Representative Heckler's request and he will take action on it.

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3. (Internal Use Only - RJK) LIAISON Met Bill Hogan, on the staff of the House Armed Services Committee, in the Rayburn Building and he asked if we could provide him with the Memoranda for Record from Agency briefings of the Special Subcommittee on Intelligence, House Armed Services Committee, on 23 September and 12 December of this year, which include intelligence updates on Angola. I told Mr. Hogan I would relay this information and we would have the papers for him tomorrow morning.

4. (Unclassified - DFM) ADMINISTRATIVE - DELIVERIES Delivered to the office of the Defense Subcommittee, House Appropriations Committee, a paper for Chuck Snodgrass on Section 662 of the Foreign Assistance Act and a paper on the Reserve fund. Also delivered to the office of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee for Pat Holt, Staff Director, transcripts of the full Committee's 6 November hearing and the Committee's Subcommittee on Foreign Assistance and Economic Policy 16 December hearing.

5. (Unclassified - DFM) LIAISON Received another call from Sue Huck, in the office of Representative Larry McDonald (D., Ga.), regarding her inquiry on Soviet slave labor camps. I told her I was working on her request

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25X1 4. [ ] LIAISON Received a call from Sue Huck, in the office of Representative Larry McDonald (D., Ga.). Huck had obtained ERTS photographs of the Soviet Union and was attempting to identify "slave labor camps." She wanted some advice from a photo interpreter on how this might be done. I told her that I didn't know what assistance we could provide, but that I would be back in touch regarding her request.

25X1 5. [ ] ADMINISTRATIVE - DELIVERIES Delivered to Judy Windham, on the staff of Representative Harold T. Johnson (D., Calif.), a copy of the Agency publication entitled "Potential Implications of Trends in the World Population, Food Production, and Climate," per her request.

25X1 6. [ ] LIAISON Bill Berry, INR/State Department, called to ask whether Senators Daniel K. Inouye (D., Hawaii) and Edward Brooke (R., Mass.) have been exposed to compartmented information. I pointed out that both were members of the Senate Appropriations Committee and could have received information at this level at an Agency briefing although it probably would not have been identified as such. I also explained that our briefings focus on the product rather than the means of collection. Berry said that this was the kind of guidance he needed.

25X1 1. [REDACTED] INTELLIGENCE BRIEFING During the day in several conversations with Dick Moose, ~~Senate Foreign Relations Committee~~ staff, confirmed William Nelson's, DDO, appearance before the Senate Foreign Relations Foreign Assistance and Economic Policy Subcommittee to brief on covert actions and the situation in two foreign countries, to be followed up by a briefing by Deputy Secretary Robert Ingersoll, State Department. The briefing is scheduled for tomorrow at 9:15 a.m. in S 116, the Capitol.

25X1 2. [REDACTED] LIAISON Spoke with Kempton Jenkins, Congressional Relations, State Department, to be sure he was aware of the pending secret session of the Senate on Wednesday to discuss Angola. In connection with the Senate Foreign Relations Foreign Assistance and Economic Policy ~~Subcommittee~~ briefing tomorrow, State is of the opinion that it should be a joint CIA/State briefing. It should be done with both CIA and State present at the same time.

25X1 3. [REDACTED] LIAISON Called Bob Wolthius, White House, and alerted him to the secret session Wednesday on Angola and advised him of the support we intended to render to our committees. Wolthius said he will mention the matter to Max Friedersdorf, White House, and asked us to keep them posted on any significant developments.

25X1 4. [REDACTED] LIAISON Called Pete Roussel, White House, in connection with Ambassador Bush's nomination hearing earlier in the day. I suggested some areas which Ambassador Bush may wish to clarify on the answers he provided to questions concerning the Official Secrets Act, Section 662 of the Foreign Assistance Act, the role of the ambassador, and providing NIE's to the Congress. Roussel said our points were well taken, he would pass them on to Ambassador Bush, and suggested that one of us stand by tomorrow during the second day of hearings for possible help.

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25X1 5. [REDACTED] LIAISON Called Stuart Statler, Minority Counsel, Permanent Subcommittee on Investigations, Senate Government Operations Committee, and provided him the name of the facility which had been the subject of an investigation by one of his investigators, Howard Marks. In response to Statler's query, I suggested that rather than provide him a fill-in with what the unit does, we get to the point about what concerns them about the organization and in that way we can satisfy their needs and our secrecy requirements. He said they were interested in whether the unit had any relationship with the intelligence activities of the police department of the city involved, and I told him we would be back in touch.

25X1 6. [REDACTED] INTELLIGENCE BRIEFING In several conversations with Mark Moran, in the office of Senator John Tunney (D., Calif.), it was agreed that we would provide the Senator a briefing on Angola at 1100 tomorrow in his office. Throughout, I made clear the reasons why we could not cover the U. S. side of the equation, that we were not trying to play games, but merely follow the rules that had been carefully set out by the Senate when Section 662 of the Foreign Assistance Act was enacted. Moran said that it was Senator Tunney who had pushed for the secret session of the Senate on Wednesday to discuss Angola and that the Senator did not think too highly of my suggestion that he seek the information he wished from the committees who are receiving covert action reporting since "they would just give him a run-around." I told Moran that we would be there at 1100 but I could not guarantee that we could provide the covert action material and if this was the case I hoped the Senator would appreciate our position.

[REDACTED] BRIEFING In response to his earlier call, made arrangements with Robert Sherman, Legislative Assistant to Representative Robert Leggett (D., Calif.), for a briefing on Angola for the Congressman on Wednesday, 17 December at 4:00 p.m. This will involve only a substantive intelligence briefing per Sherman.

25X1 8. [REDACTED] LIAISON Pat Holt, Chief of Staff, ~~Senate Foreign Relations Committee~~, called and advised me of the interest of Senator Howard Baker (R., Tenn.) in connection with foreign travel soon to be undertaken which was passed on to Mr. Duckett, DDS&T.

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13. [Redacted] INTELLIGENCE BRIEFING Called Neil Newhouse, on the staff of the House Wednesday Group, and set up 10:00 a.m. Thursday for his briefing on Canadian trade. The briefing will be given at Headquarters.

14. [Redacted] LEGISLATION Received a call from Jim Oliver, OMB, and agreed to provide him a paper on legislation affecting CIA by COB tomorrow.

15. [Redacted] INTEL BRIEFING MIDDLE EAST (Arab-Israeli Military Balance) I accompanied [Redacted] OCI, and [Redacted] OCI, to brief Dick Moose, Staff Associate, Subcommittee on Far Eastern Affairs, Senate Committee on Foreign Relations. Moose read Mr. Colby's letter to Senator Hubert H. Humphrey (D., Minn.), commenting on Tad Szulc's New Republic article. Moose said it was possible that he might want to show it to Senator Humphrey. It was agreed that we will take it down whenever Moose called. Moose also suggested a similar memo on the Israeli economic situation might be useful and that it might be desirable to so brief Senator Humphrey on the economic situation as well. We agreed to standby for such a request.

(See Memo for the Record.) This meeting was called by Chairman John Stennis D., Miss.) late this afternoon. Ed Braswell, Chief Counsel of the Committee, said the Chairman wanted the briefing after reading the article in today's paper about the CIA spending \$50 million in Angola.

[REDACTED] INTELLIGENCE BRIEFING Richard Moose, Subcommittee on Foreign Assistance, Senate Foreign Relations Committee staff, called and said the Subcommittee was marking up its bill today and came to the amendment by Senator Dick Clark (D., Iowa) on Angola. He said they had earlier discussed Senator George McGovern's (D., S. Dak.) amendment re CIA and Portugal. After discussing these in open session, they decided they should have witnesses from State and CIA come up before the Subcommittee on Tuesday at 9:30 a. m. to brief on Angola and Portugal. Moose asked if either Mr. Colby or Mr. William Nelson, DDO, could come up on Tuesday. I told him the Director has a briefing scheduled for 9:45 a. m. on Tuesday and he asked if I would check to see if Mr. Nelson could do it. I told him I would pass the message on.

25X1 8. [REDACTED] LEGISLATION Talked to Bob Carlstrom, OMB, regarding the Agency's letters on financial disclosure which are at OMB for clearance. Carlstrom said he was not at all familiar with the subject, but would look into it and get back to me.

25X1 9. [REDACTED] LIAISON Took a call from Charles Flynn, in the office of Representative Edward Koch (D., N. Y.). Flynn asked if there had been an official CIA or Intelligence Community budget figure released. I told him there had been leaks of the figures, but that it was still considered classified and therefore no official release had been made.

(Unclassified - GLC) LIAISON John Goldsmith, staff of Senate Armed Services Committee, called and said that Clark McFadden, also of the Committee, had told him that one of our station guys is likely to be in town over the holidays and Goldsmith would like to get in touch with him. He asked me to stop by to see him and I said I would look into it.
13. (Unclassified - KSN) LIAISON Connie Carmichael, secretary to Richard Moose, Senate Foreign Relations Committee, called and asked if we could change the meeting scheduled for 4:00 this afternoon to 5:00 instead. She also said if today was not convenient, Monday afternoon at 4:00 would be fine. After checking with [redacted] OCI, I called Ms. Carmichael back and confirmed 4:00 Monday afternoon for the meeting.
14. (Internal Use Only - PLC) LEGISLATION Received a call from Hilda Schreiber, OMB, concerning the Agency's proposal to further amend CIARDS to provide for a spouse to expressly waive surviving benefits and to provide a minimum survivor annuity. She was negative to the proposal but after our discussion she said she would coordinate the proposal with State and the Civil Service Commission.
15. (Internal Use Only - PLC) THIRD AGENCY Received a call from Bob Hull, Office of Personnel, State Department, inquiring as to the status of our CIARDS package. I gave him the status and also informed him of Schreiber's call. (See item 14 above) Hull considered it a good dig and indicated he would support it. I sent him a copy of our letter to OMB on the proposal.
16. (Unclassified - PLC) LIAISON Called Jim Michie, Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Administrative Practice and Procedure staff, and requested copies of the transcript of Carl Duckett's, DDS&T, and Sayre Stevens, ADDS&T, testimony before the Subcommittee on 7 November 1975. Slatinshek said that he realized we were touching base with him but said he was concerned as to what such notification meant in terms of approval and endorsement by the Committee. I told him I would pass this on to [REDACTED] which I did.

I went by the office of Representative James P. Johnson (R., Colo.), and in his absence, gave his Administrative Assistant, William Cleary, a sealed envelope containing a letter from Director Colby and an attachment regarding [REDACTED] which had been prepared in response to a telephone call from Representative Johnson to the Director.

4. [REDACTED] BRIEFING I dropped off with Rick

Gilmore, on the staff of the Subcommittee on Multinational Corporations, Senate Foreign Relations Committee, two unclassified papers prepared by OCI on the possible political implications of the variance in grain production figures which Gilmore had picked up during his recent trip to Moscow.

Wednesday - 10 December 1975

1. (Unclassified - RC) LIAISON FOIA I took a call from Walter J. Sheridan, Chief Investigator, Subcommittee on Administrative Practice and Procedure, Senate Committee on the Judiciary. Sheridan advised he had two letters from the [redacted] family to Senator Edward M. Kennedy (D., Mass.) regarding the Agency's failure to respond to their FOIA request. I said I would check and call back later.

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2. (Internal Use Only - DFM) LIAISON Received a call from Vince Morelli, on the staff of Representative Jack Kemp (R., N. Y.). The Congressman is preparing to introduce proposals and speak about congressional oversight of CIA, and Morelli asked to meet with an Agency representative to hear our views on the subject. I agreed to meet with Morelli sometime next week.

3. (Unclassified - DFM) LEGISLATION Called Sheridan Brinley, in the Office of Legislative Affairs at AID, regarding congressional action on amendments [redacted] Such amendments, to the foreign military assistance legislation, are before both the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and House International Relations Committee. Brinley said he expected votes in both Committees this week on these amendments.

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4. (Unclassified - DFM) LEGISLATION Called Everett Bierman, House International Relations Committee staff, about the Harrington/Bonkers amendment to the foreign military assistance legislation, which would halt U. S. Government aid to any group in Angola. Bierman said the Committee had not yet dealt with the amendment, but was unable to give me a firm prognosis on it. He said Ted Dobbs was handling the bill in mark-up for the State Department.

5. (Unclassified - DFM) LEGISLATION Called Ted Dobbs, Congressional Relations, Department of State, regarding the International Relations Committee' mark-up on the foreign military assistance legislation. He outlined State's position against the Harrington/Bonkers amendment which is that massive Soviet and Cuban aid to the MPLA threatens political stability in all of southern Africa and the U. S. Government must have the flexibility to aid friendly forces.

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25X1 11. [ ] BRIEFING After having received authorization from the Director to brief Representative Charles A. Vanik (D., Ohio) on past Agency procedures in obtaining taxpayer information, I called Larry Ross, on the staff of the House Ways and Means Committee, and Bill Vaughn, on the staff of the Committee, to set up a meeting. Neither Ross nor Vaughn were in the office that day so I called Dianne Tomasek, Appointment Secretary for Representative Vanik, and made an appointment to see the Congressman at 1430 hours in his office.

1. [REDACTED] ADMINISTRATIVE - DELIVERIES Delivered the Director's letter on the status of [REDACTED] to Jane McMullan, Senate Appropriations Committee staff; Clark McFadden, Senate Armed Services Committee staff; and Frank Slatinshek, House Armed Services Committee staff. 25X1A

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2. [REDACTED] LEGISLATION Talked to Clark McFadden, Senate Armed Services Committee staff, about the medical malpractice immunity legislation. He said that the Committee definitely would not consider the issue before the Christmas recess and probably would schedule hearings in early 1976 on the subject. They will ask an Agency representative to testify on our need for inclusion within the bill. He said either Senator Sam Nunn's (D., Ga.) Subcommittee on Manpower and Personnel or Senator Harry Byrd's (I., Va.) Subcommittee on General Legislation would handle the bill, depending on the relative work load of the two Subcommittees. He said a Justice Department proposal to give all Federal doctors malpractice immunity had come to the Committee's attention, and indicated this would be one argument against inclusion of CIA within the present legislation.

3. [REDACTED] LEGISLATION Called Dan Spiegel, Legislative Assistant to Senator Hubert Humphrey (D., Minn.), regarding the mark-up hearings scheduled tomorrow before Senator Humphrey's Subcommittee on Foreign Assistance and Economic Policy, Senate Committee on Foreign Relations. I inquired about Senator Dick Clark's (D., Iowa) amendment [REDACTED] Spiegel said the Subcommittee is expected to consider the amendment but may not do so at tomorrow's meeting. He recommended that the Agency get a paper to the Committee on the amendment. 25X1A

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4. [REDACTED] LIAISON Accompanied the Director to a briefing of the House International Relations Committee on several covert action programs. (See Memo for the Record.)

[REDACTED] LIAISON Called Jane McMullen, Senate Appropriations, and asked her to advise Guy McConnell, also of that staff, that the Director would brief the Committee on 16 December at 10:00 a. m. on covert actions (the Intelligence Operations Subcommittee) and at 10:30 a. m. on the Middle East (the full Committee). She said she would give this message to McConnell.

Y.), I talked to his Administrative Assistant, Randal Teague concerning Mr. Kemp's question following the House Appropriations Committee briefing this morning as to whether we could tell him about the situation between Secretary Henry Kissinger and Representative Otis Pike (D., N. Y.). I told Teague I thought the Executive Branch had gone as far as it could in attempting to avoid this issue and I hoped it would be resolved without further formal action by the Congress.

[REDACTED] LIAISON Called Guy McConnell, Senate Appropriations Committee staff, and told him about the Director's session with the House Appropriations Defense Subcommittee this morning on covert action and that the Director said he felt some were for and some were against the expenditure [REDACTED], but that we could go ahead. 25X1A I told McConnell that we are flat up against it on money and wondered 25X1A

25X1 8. [REDACTED] LIAISON Accompanied the Director to a briefing of the House Appropriations Defense Subcommittee on several covert action programs. (See Memo for the Record.)

25X1 9. [REDACTED] LIAISON Dick Moose, ~~Senate Foreign~~ 25X1A Relations staff, called and said they would have to cancel the meeting tomorrow with Senator Hubert Humphrey (D., Minn.). He asked if [REDACTED] OCL. 25X1A and I could meet with Moose on Thursday. I said I would check with [REDACTED] and be back in touch with a time.

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13. [redacted] LIAISON Senator Milton Young (R., N. Dak.) called and asked if the New York Times article on 5 December concerning Soviet ABM radars was accurate. I said I had not seen the article on 5 December, but my recollection was that the story was pretty accurate. Late in the morning, Carl Duckett, DDS&T, and I met with the Senator and Duckett confirmed my earlier statement and briefed him on SALT and Soviet compliance.

14. [redacted] LIAISON Guy McConnell, Senate Appropriations Defense Subcommittee staff, called and said we would have to put off until next week the Director's briefing of the Subcommittee on covert action.

15. [redacted] LIAISON In response to Senator Milton Young's (R., N. Dak.) request to Mr. Cary this morning, I called Mrs. Young and gave her the current address of Mr. James Schlesinger and also a citation to a New York Times editorial on CIA in Chile.

16. [redacted] LIAISON Accompanied the Director to a briefing of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee on recent covert action approvals and related matters. (See Memo for the Record.)

17. [redacted] ADMINISTRATIVE Called Russ Rourke, in the office of Jack Marsh, Counsellor to the President, and asked him about the plans for the confirmation hearings of Ambassador Bush. Rourke said that Bush is due in Washington tomorrow and that William Kendall and Patrick O'Donnell, of the White House Legislative staff, will be taking him on courtesy calls to the different offices on the Hill. Rourke also said they are still looking for the confirmation hearings to start on 15 December. I told Rourke that Chairman John Stennis (D., Miss.), of the Senate Armed Services Committee, would abide by any decision the President makes in regard to Bush's confirmation hearings.

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8. [REDACTED] THIRD AGENCY Received a call from Roger Whidden, in the office of the Assistant Attorney General, concerning Senator Edward Kennedy's (D., Mass.) letter as Chairman, Senate Labor and Public Welfare Subcommittee on Health to the Attorney General requesting that the Agency documents on distribution of drug files be publicly released with the names deleted. He asked who in Justice had advised the Agency that public release could jeopardize the constitutional rights of a former employee. I told him that we were so advised by Mr. Thornburg, with the concurrence of Deputy Attorney General Tyler. Whidden said he was handling the request and will let us know their decision.

9. [REDACTED] HEARING Arranged for security inspection and monitoring of room S. 116 Capitol and reporter's notes pick up for Director's meeting with Senator John Sparkman (D., Ala.) and Senator Clifford P. Case (R., N.J.).

10. [REDACTED] LIAISON Paul Hoff, Counsel, Senate Government Operations Committee, called to alert me that the Committee had invited Mr. Colby to testify before the Committee on the subject of congressional oversight during the week of either 19 or 26 January 1976. He said they would probably ask Mr. Colby to lead off one of the days of testimony and asked that I be back in touch with him regarding what day would be best for the Director. He also said it was his understanding that the Senate Select Committee had decided to cancel its oversight hearings in order not to duplicate the work of the Government Operations Committee.

11. [REDACTED] CONSTITUENT Received a call from Louise Buchanan, in the office of Representative Jack Kemp (R., N.Y.). She asked how a constituent, a black Buffalo lawyer, might apply for a legal position with the Agency. I explained that we had a very active minority hiring program and agreed to send her an application and information on the Agency for forwarding to the constituent.

12. [REDACTED] LEGISLATION Called Don Henderson, on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee staff, regarding the mark-up on S. 2662, the military foreign assistance legislation, scheduled by the Subcommittee on Foreign Assistance and Economic Policy of the Foreign Relations Committee for 10 December. Henderson said he was not the one to talk to on this bill, and referred me to Norvill Jones or Dick Moose, both of the Subcommittee.

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5. [ ] BRIEFING I met and accompanied Rick Gilmore and Jerry Levinson, on the staff of the Subcommittee on Multinational Corporations, Senate Foreign Relations Committee, to [ ]'s office, OER, for a debriefing of Gilmore on his recent trip to Moscow. Although Gilmore raised some questions about the accuracy of some information we had given him prior to his trip, these questions were answered to Gilmore's apparent satisfaction and overall the briefing went well. Gilmore said he is preparing a report on Soviet grain and his trip for the full Committee. [ ] is writing a Memorandum for the Record.

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6. [ ] LIAISON I called Mike Finley, on the staff of the Subcommittee on International Political and Military Affairs, House International Relations Committee, and told him that Agency officers handling Argentine matters had advised that while there was still considerable violence and a current upsurge therein there was no indication that terrorists were targeting on American citizens and that a trip in mid-January would prove uneventful as far as personal security goes. I did caution him that no one could guarantee anything and that anyone could get caught inadvertently in some problem, but barring that type of accident it would probably be safe. I told him the embassy in Buenos Aires had a special committee that kept the State Department aware of current problems and that he should check with Bob Felder at State, who could recommend safe hotels and give him a last minute briefing on the situation. He thanked me for the information.

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7. [ ] BRIEFING INTELLIGENCE/SALT COMPLIANCE I escorted Clark McFadden, Counsel, Senate Armed Services Committee, to Mr. Carl Duckett's, DD/S&T, office for an updated briefing on SALT compliance. Focus was on Kamchatka radar, but mention was made of camouflage mobile missiles and SS-19 silo size. There was also discussion of difficulty in verification of cruise missile limitations in terms of SALT II.
