see if he would be willing to assert jurisdiction in this instance.

Later in the day, Marsh called to say that he struck out completely
with Pike who said this was a matter we should take up with Representative
Jack Brooks (D., Tex.), Chairman of the full House Government Operations
Committee. I told Marsh that I didn't think this would be successful since
we were already having jurisdictional problems with Brooks in connection
with his request for a copy of the Inspector General's report of 1973.

25X1A tions Committee staff, called regarding the Director's appearance before
the Intelligence Operations Subcommittee on Wednesday, 30 July 1975 and
said he wanted to be sure that the Director covered the situation in Turkey
and also in Panama. I gave him a little rundown about our concern about
[redacted] and said I am sure the Director will cover these
two areas in his briefing.

25X1 13. [redacted] Received a call from Mark Kleiman, on
the staff of Representative Les Aspin (D., Wis.), concerning the recent
allegations about Agency counterfeiting of U. S. currency for use in South-
east Asia. I told Kleiman that there was no truth to these allegations and
in response to his questions about an inquiry by Senator Henry M. Jackson's
(D., Wash.) Permanent Investigations Subcommittee I said that we were
doing everything we could to refute these allegations, but this is another
case where it is difficult to prove the negative. He asked that we keep him
posted on this subject and I said I would do so.

25X1 14. [redacted] Bill Ashworth, on the staff of the Arms
Control, International Organizations and Security Agreements Subcommittee,
Senate Foreign Relations Committee, called to make a last minute check on
Carl Duckett's briefing of the Subcommittee tomorrow morning. He wanted
to be sure that the briefing didn't merely go through the various countries in
alphabetical order. I told him that I was quite sure that Mr. Duckett planned
to cover the most important countries first and then cover the remaining
countries in order of the decreasing likelihood of their developing nuclear
weapons capability. The above information was passed on to Sayre Stevens,
Associate Deputy Director for Science and Technology, who saw no difficulty
with it.

34. [Redacted] Met with Bill Ashworth, staff of Senate Foreign Relations, in response to his request and he asked if we could give Senator Stuart Symington's (D., Mo.) Subcommittee on Arms Control, International Organizations and Security Agreements, Senate Foreign Relations Committee, a briefing on Tuesday, the 29th of July covering nuclear weapons developments in the 29 nations who are parties to the international agreement for cooperation. He said that Symington has gone to the IAEA on this matter and plans to hold hearings next Tuesday which will include in addition to the Agency witness, Messrs. Freedman of ERDA, Kratzer of State and George Vest, Director of Politico-Military Affairs, Department of State. He said the Senator would want our witness (presumably Carl Duckett) to discuss the steps which each nation has taken (or has not taken) in the development of nuclear weapons. He said he would also want us to cover those countries who we thought would join the "nuclear club" whether or not they were parties to the international agreement. He specifically mentioned Korea, Taiwan, Brazil, Argentina and India. He also cautioned against our invoking the safeguard provisions since, as he put it, Senator Symington can effectively dispel this argument. I told him I would be back to him on this tomorrow.

35. [Redacted] Called Bob Carlstrom, OMB, to alert him to our reports on H. R. 61 and S. 1428 (criminal justice information) and to ask him to expedite their clearance. I pointed out that they were virtually identical to the report the Agency submitted earlier on the Justice Department draft bill on criminal justice information. He said he would do his best.

AUTHORIZING ADDITIONAL EXPENDITURES BY THE
COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN RELATIONS FOR INQUIRIES
AND INVESTIGATIONS

Mr. CANNON, from the Committee on Rules and Administration,
submitted the following

REPORT

[To accompany S. Res. 84]

The Committee on Rules and Administration, to which was referred the resolution (S. Res. 84) authorizing additional expenditures by the Committee on Foreign Relations for inquiries and investigations, having considered the same, reports favorably thereon with amendments and recommends that the resolution as amended be agreed to.

Senate Resolution 84 as referred would authorize the Committee on Foreign Relations, or any subcommittee thereof, from March 1, 1975, through February 29, 1976, to expend not to exceed \$1,522,000 for inquiries and investigations. The funds requested by the committee would be allocated to specific inquiries and to the procurement of the services of individual consultants or organizations thereof as follows:

Section 2 of the resolution would provide that not to exceed \$60,000 would be available for the procurement of the services of individual consultants, or organizations thereof.

Section 4 of the resolution would provide that not to exceed \$885,000 would be available for a study of matters pertaining to the foreign policy of the United States, of which amount not to exceed \$25,000 could be expended for the procurement of consultants;

Section 5 of the resolution would provide that not to exceed \$390,000 would be available for a study or investigation of multinational corporations and their effect on United States foreign policy, of which amount not to exceed \$20,000 could be expended for the procurement of consultants; and

Section 6 of the resolution would provide that not to exceed \$247,000 would be available for a study or investigation of foreign assistance and economic policy, of which amount not to exceed \$15,000 could be expended for the procurement of consultants.

During the second session of the 93d Congress the committee was authorized by Senate Resolution 241, agreed to March 1, 1974, to expend not to exceed \$851,800¹ for a study of matters pertaining to the foreign policy of the United States. The committee estimates that the unobligated balance under that authorization as of February 28, 1975 (funds returnable to the Treasury), will be approximately \$116,800.

At the request of the Committee on Foreign Relations, the Committee on Rules and Administration is reporting Senate Resolution 84 with an amendment in the nature of a substitute, which amendment would eliminate separate funding for the Subcommittee on Multinational Corporations and the Subcommittee on Foreign Assistance and Economic Policy. (See joint letter dated July 11, 1975, to Chairman Cannon from Chairman Sparkman and Ranking Minority Member Case, which letter may be found on p. 5 of this report.)

The Committee also has amended the resolution by—

(1) reducing the total requested amount from \$1,522,000 to \$1,083,000, a reduction of \$438,000; and

(2) incorporating a technical amendment.

A joint letter (with accompanying budgets) in support of Senate Resolution 84 addressed to Senator Howard W. Cannon, chairman of the Committee on Rules and Administration, by Senator John Sparkman, chairman, and Senator Clifford P. Case, ranking minority member, of the Committee on Foreign Relations, is as follows:

DEAR MR. CHAIRMAN: We refer to the resolution pending before the Committee on Rules and Administration which would authorize the Committee on Foreign Relations to expend not to exceed \$1,522,000 to study matters pertaining to the foreign policy of the United States.

This resolution was ordered reported unanimously by the Committee on February 18, 1975, and it is our hope that the Rules Committee will approve the full amount requested so that the Foreign Relations Committee will have adequate funds to carry on its responsibilities.

As you requested in your letter of January 10, 1975, there are enclosed two copies of the proposed budgets for the full Committee, as well as its Subcommittees on Multinational Corporations and

Foreign Assistance and Economic Policy. In view of the fact that these budgets provide for an increase of 17 employees, it is requested that the Committee on Foreign Relations be assigned additional office space.

On July 8, 1975, Chairman Cannon addressed a letter to the chairman of each Senate committee having a funding resolution pending before the Committee on Rules and Administration, requesting information as to (1) the number of committee members who would be eligible to appoint additional staff pursuant to Senate Resolution 60, and (2) whether the addition of such legislative assistants to committee members would justify a reduction by the Rules Committee in that committee's pending request for funds. In response to that request, Senator John Sparkman, chairman, and Senator Clifford P. Case, ranking minority member, of the Committee on Foreign Relations, advised as follows:

DEAR MR. CHAIRMAN: This is in response to your letter of July 8 concerning the annual expenditure authorization resolutions for Senate committees as affected by S. Res. 60.

Pursuant to Section 3 of that resolution, the Secretary of the Senate has been advised that Senators Sparkman and Case are the only members of the Foreign Relations Committee who have made, recommended, or approved the appointment of any staff members of the Committee. Therefore, each of the 15 other members of the Committee will be eligible to appoint staff pursuant to S. Res. 60.

S. Res. 84, the Foreign Relations Committee's expenditure authorization resolution pending before the Rules Committee, contemplates the employment of 17 additional staff members, of whom 9 (6 professionals and 3 clericals) would be for the minority and 8 (5 professionals and 3 clericals) would be for the new Subcommittee on Foreign Assistance. The request for additional minority staff was based on providing one professional for every minority member except Senator Case. That has now been provided through S. Res. 60 and inasmuch as the Committee is not expected to provide clerical assistance for S. Res. 60 employees, it seems to us that the 9 additional minority staff members provided for in S. Res. 84 can now be eliminated. These positions were budgeted at \$288,000 on an annual basis.

S. Res. 60 also produces an effect on the structure of S. Res. 84. For the first time, as far as the Foreign Relations Committee is concerned, S. Res. 84 would provide separate funding for two subcommittees—one on Multinational Corporations and one on Foreign Assistance. If that structure is preserved, then the chairmen of those subcommittees (Senators Church and Humphrey, respectively) would, as we understand it, be precluded from making appointments under S. Res. 60—a result contrary to what the Foreign Relations Committee intended when it agreed on the implementation of S. Res. 60. (Senator Case, as the ranking minority member on both subcommittees as well as the full committee, would not be affected.) We would suggest, therefore, that the Rules Committee amend S. Res. 84 to eliminate sep-

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arate funding for both subcommittees. If this is done, it would seem to us that at least one of the 5 new professionals requested for the Subcommittee on Foreign Assistance could also be eliminated—a position budgeted for \$35,000 on an annual basis.
