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5. (Internal Use Only - RJK) Received a call from Andrew Mayer, Congressional Research Service, Library of Congress, who said that, in connection with a study on Greece and Turkey his staff was doing, the question of location of certain kinds of intelligence installations had arisen. After checking with Robert Hepworth, Congressional Support Officer, OCI, I called Mayer back and told him that these locations were very sensitive and had to be protected from public disclosure. Mayer understood perfectly and appreciated our effort to assist him.

6. (Confidential - BAA) Donna Larsen, Secretary to Jack Marsh, Counsellor to the President, called and said the U-2 transcripts were still in General Scowcroft's office. They did not realize the length of the project but are working on them as fast as they can. She said she will let me know when they are finished.

7. (Confidential - GLC) David Martin, ~~Senate Internal Security Subcommittee staff~~ called and asked for a computer printout of the activities of [redacted] any substantive information on any of his activities, a list of any U. S. Communist Party delegations that have gone to Communist meetings outside the U. S., and anything on International Communist Conferences. [redacted] is checking this out.

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8. (Confidential - GLC) Called Bill Hogan, House Armed Services Committee staff, and advised him [redacted]

[redacted] Hogan asked about the staff memorandum that was mentioned in today's papers concerning Mr. Colby and the Rockefeller Commission. I said I didn't know the story on that but that the Commission did say in their report that overall they thought it was best to have a non-career man in the top job. I added they also thought that some part of the budget should be made public. Hogan felt this was terrible. He said as a matter of fact it probably is a blessing during these difficult days to have a career man who can understand the situation better. I heartily agreed.

9. (Confidential - GLC) Acting on an alert from Messrs. Blake and Knoche, I contacted Jack Boos and Searle Field of the House Select Committee staff regarding the presence of a Committee investigator at the [redacted] offices (see Memorandum for the Record).

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Thursday - 3 July 1975

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23. (Internal Use Only - PLC) Delivered to Mike Cavanagh, Staff Assistant, House Post Office and Civil Service Subcommittee on Postal Facilities, Mail, and Labor Management, a letter from Acting Director General Walters to Chairman Charles H. Wilson (D., Calif.) in response to the request for the Director to appear to discuss the mail intercept program.

Shortly thereafter, George Gould, Staff Director of the Subcommittee, called to confirm Chairman Wilson's request that the Director appear on 10 July 1975 at 1000 hours, as previously discussed. The hearing will be in executive session and the Director may present an opening statement if he so desires.

24. (Internal Use Only - PLC) Met with Jim George, professional staff member for Senator Bill Brock (R., Tenn.), and discussed his request which was referred to me by J. Sourwine, Chief Counsel, ~~Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Internal Security~~. George stated that Senator Brock is concerned by the attacks on CIA and wants to make a brief floor statement on the KGB and the threat it represents. He asked if we could provide him any items from open sources showing KGB penetrations, such as the Willy Brandt case. I gave him the figure of 390 recruitment attempts against Americans referred to by the Director in his testimony on 5 March 1975 before the Abzug Subcommittee on Government Information and Individual Rights of House Government Operations. I told him that I would check to see if anything can be pulled together for him.
